PROHIBITION VERSUS THE COMPANY SYSTEM.
There was much rejoicing in anti-prohibition circles when Vermont, after many years under prohibition returned to the license system, with local option as to granting or refusing license. But the tendency is now again toward greater restriction of the liquor traffic. Last year there were sixty cities and towns which voted in favor of granting licenses. At the recent annual election only 21 cities and towns voted in favor of license, and wherever license won it was by greatly reduced majorities. Rutland, where the agitation in favor of high license in preference to prohibition was started two years ago, and where licenses were granted last year by a majority of 102. Five cities out of fourteen remain in the license column, as compared with nine out of fourteen last year. The Halifax Chronicle, which opposes prohibition and the Scott Act, in commenting upon the above facts furnished by a correspondent, expresses its belief that "total abstinence is better in nearly every case for the individual and the most rigid possible control of liquor selling is best for the community." It also admits that "high license is little if any more promising as a temperance measure than low license. It has never, so far as we are aware been a success anywhere. True it has considerably reduced the number of licensed places of sale in given communities, but unlicensed places have mostly shown a corresponding increase and drunkenness has not materially if at all decreased. This is the testimony of all impartial and trustworthy observers." So much for high license. The Chronicle further admits that low license does not promote temperance in Halifax, but claims that the towns under the Scott Act show as large a proportion of drunkenness as the Nova Scotia metropolises. The Chronicle's favorite plan is the company system, but it admits this system is not a panacea for the liquor evil, and indeed is far from it. "The most that is claimed for it," says the Chronicle, "is that it minimises the evils of selling by eliminating the element of private gain and helps to promote temptations to drink, and by furnishing the funds for reform campaigning in every promising way. In other words it prevents the profits of liquor selling from reaching the pocket of the private individual who is interested in swelling them to the utmost extent and diverts them to the trustees of the community at large who are concerned only to minimize them as much as possible." This reads plausibly enough to those who do not look beneath the surface. But when the Chronicle proceeds to tell how the company system works when at its best, as in Bergen, Norway, we begin to lose the faith that it seeks to inspire. Bergen, we are told, has only eight places

of sale for a population of 70,000. The Chronicle proceeds to tell what would happen if the plan were tried in Halifax: "Liquor would probably be still dispensed in certain vile houses which apparently cannot be now suppressed." But we are told, "the questions of after hour selling and Sunday selling would be solved, there would be no selling on holidays or other times of special temptation. Every means of persuading men not to drink instead of tempting them to drink would be adopted." And so on, to a most lame and impotent conclusion. There would still be the "vile houses" and places of illegal sale as The Chronicle admits there are in high license towns and as it charges there are under the Scott Act and prohibition, and these in addition to the company's liquor shops. And the "vile places" and illegal dens would certainly not pay more heed to the regulations of the company system than they now pay to the Scott Act or prohibition. In other words the company system would throw the sanction of the law around the liquor traffic, and as far as possible make it a "respectable" producer of revenue for the Province, or the municipality. The Chronicle finds the temperance men of the Province opposed to it, and they have good reason to be and remain opposed. It finds "the present liquor regulations (Halifax has a license law) are a disgrace to all temperance people," because apparently liquor is sold at all hours on all days, and in vile houses and unlicensed places. Logically and as experience proves, the best remedy is total prohibition. The traffic is in itself lawless. There is hope that in time the people of Nova Scotia will come to a firm conviction as the people of Prince Edward Island have come, and to which the people of Vermont are returning, that it is best to prohibit an evil which it has been found impossible to regulate.
