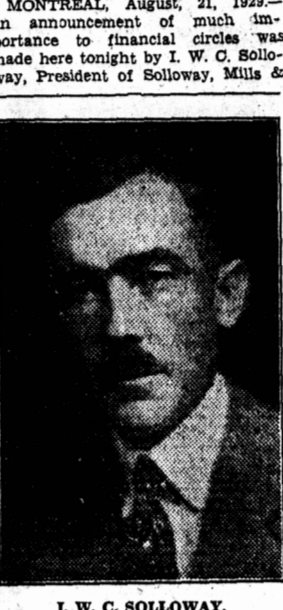

THREATEN NUDE WALK TO STATES. VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug 27.—Sons of freedom, a faction of the Doukhobor sect which has been having trouble with the British Columbia Government, following the burning of half a dozen schools this year, threatens to go on a march to the United States in the "altogether" according to a letter sent the Government and the press.

The letter is signed by a committee of twenty, and they intimate that if Uncle Sam does not welcome this clothesless parade they will go to Mexico, although they do not explain how they propose reaching there. DEMAND RELEASE. Hailed from Shore Acres, seventeen miles west of Nelson, the letter makes a demand for the release of Paul Wlosoff, held in connection with recent burning of schools. The letter goes on: "Now we openly declare and ask you to give serious attention to the following: If you will not release our brother, Paul Wlosoff, from jail, we will come and give you our clothes as Christ said, 'If they take your outer clothes give them your under also.'"

"And then we will start in pilgrimage where God will lead us. We will knock at the door of the United States of America and ask them for shelter. If they will not have a place for us, we will then go to Mexico or to some other savage people. We cannot serve two masters, Governments and God."

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Canadian Chamber Of Commerce Tour

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 27.—(By H. M. Peters, Canadian Press Staff writer)—The 1929 tour of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, a trip which will last approximately a month and take its members practically from coast to coast, embracing the annual meeting to be held at Edmonton and Calgary, began tonight when the delegates from Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, left here on a special train for Toronto. Members from Ontario will join the party tomorrow and the journey through Ontario will commence. Before the delegates have reached their homes again they will have seen the Peace River district; the Turner Valley oil development; toured through the Rockies, visiting such places as Jasper Park, Banff Springs and Lake Louise; visited the immense smelters at Trail, B. C.; and have listened to probably the only address to be made during his present Canadian tour by a famous British yachtsman to the Dominion, Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery, former Secretary of State for the Dominions. The western delegates will join the party at various points in its itinerary. The convention proper will open at Edmonton on Wednesday, Sept. 11th, and will be continued at Calgary on Thursday and Friday, Sept. 12th, and 13th. The object of the Chamber in arranging the tour was apparently to give its members a view of the country as thorough as possible consistent with the time available, and, judging from the lengthy itinerary prepared, it will succeed in presenting the picture. First comes the tour through southern Ontario, including Toronto, Port Huron, Niagara Falls, London, Windsor and Sarnia. A trip through the lakes to Port Arthur follows and there the special train will again be pressed into service for the run to Edmonton, from where it will travel through the Peace River district, spending four days in that section of the grain belt. Returning to Edmonton, the annual convention will commence. The convention theme, to be stressed by many speakers, is "Our Canadian Economic Partnership," and the first day's programme calls for addresses of welcome by the Lieutenant-Governor of Alberta, Hon. Dr. William Egbert; the Premier of Alberta, Hon. J. E. Brownlee, the Mayors of Edmonton and Calgary, and the presidents of the Edmonton Chamber of Commerce and the Calgary Board of Trade. "The part of the provinces in the Canadian Partnership" and "The Big Neighbor of the Partnership," are to be the subjects of addresses during the first day's sessions by Hon. Mr. Brownlee and William Butterworth, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, respectively. After the first day's sessions at Edmonton the party will again board

During the two days there a number of important speeches, all carrying out the theme of the "Canadian Economic Partnership," will be heard, among the speakers being: E. W. Beatty, K. C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, whose subject will be, "Transportation in the Partnership;" Robert C. Wallace, president of the University of Alberta, "Education in the Partnership;" J. W. Dufour, editor of the Winnipeg Free Press, "The Contribution of the Natural Resources to the Partnership;" Senator Gideon Robertson, "The Contribution of Labor to the Partnership;" D. Marvin, economist of the Royal Bank of Canada, "The Contribution of the Distributing Trades to the Partnership;" and H. B. Henwood, General Manager of the Bank of Toronto, "The Contribution of the Banks to the Partnership." "Co-operative Marketing of Agricultural Products in the Partnership," by H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta; "Agriculture in the Partnership," by R. J. Hutchings president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, are other addresses to be delivered at Calgary. G. Maclure, Schlanders, Saint John, N. B., on "Committee Work," and Justus Miller, Windsor, Ont., on "Place of a Board or Chamber in the smaller Community," are other speakers. At the concluding session of the convention after the election of officers, two important addresses are scheduled. The first is that of Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative Party, who will have as his subject, "Confederation as a Partnership," and Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery, on "The Empire Partnership." Mr. Amery's address will terminate the convention. COMMODITIES ON TARIFF BILL. (By Ken Clark Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)

WASH., D. C., Aug. 27.—The United States who can live in a single house, decorated with Gobelin tapestries; dress himself in garments of waste rope, adorn himself with uncut diamonds, subsist on truffles, protect himself with his trusty muzzle-loader and amuse himself by playing on an ancient double-bass" will find the tariff bill eminently satisfactory, says the Baltimore Sun. All these commodities are upon the free list. The intricacies of the 84,000 word bill offer opportunities to the wits of the press which are not being disregarded. The Sun noting changes made by the Senate Finance committee resulting in free entry for the above mentioned products and also for impure tea and London purple, says to the extent of those revisions a clean-cut victory for the consumer is represented in the report of the Senate Finance Committee. Among other items on the free list facetiously referred to as being for the benefit of the consumer are: manna, herbs, leaves, lichens and mosses and finally cyanide of potassium. The idea that the American citizen must construct his house of shingles is not quite complete. Canadian timber and lumber might be used for the joists and beams, these things entering free, but if a floor of Canadian birch, beech or maple were desired a 15 per centum ad valorem duty would have to be paid. The double-bass or fiddle with which the occupant of the Sun's house would amuse himself, would enter the United States free only if it were made before anno domini 1800; if the maker had been unable to finish it before Christmas, possibly because of an attack of lumbago and it were completed in January, 1801 the instrument would be dutiable. It is pointed out here that no distinction is made in admitting truffles whether they have been hunted by dogs or pigs but all truffles enter free.
