THE WAR THIS
WEEK

Allied forces were withdrawn
from southern Norway in the 35th
invading German army the whole
of country except the narrow coast-
al strip extending north beyond
Namsos to the Arctic. At Narvik,
the far northern end port which
of a German garrison was holding out
against besieging Allied Forces.

The decision to withdraw British
troops south of the port of Trond-
heim was announced by Prime Min-
ister Chamberlain at Parliament
on Thursday. The following day it
became known that the entire Al-
lied campaign against Trondheim
had been abandoned with the de-
parture of British and French
forces holding positions north of the
port.

Mr. Chamberlain did not disclose
what the Allies plan to do now,
but he promised that the Norweg-
ian campaign would not be regard-
ed as a "sideshow." On the other
hand he said the Government
would not allow itself to be lured
into scattering its strength in an
attempt to force the Germans open-
ings or blows elsewhere.

With the severe setback in Nor-
way apparent, the Allied High Com-
mand took precautions in regard
to Italy which he believed to be
likely to join the Nazis if Pre-
mier Mussolini could feel sure that
he would be going in on the win-
ning side. An Allied battle fleet was
dispatched to Alexandria in the
Mediterranean and British
shipping was detoured from the
Gibraltar-Suez route around the
Cape of Good Hope.

The Italians disclosed any ag-
gressive plans but Athens dispatches
told of concentrations of troops,
naval vessels and aircraft in the
Dodecanese, the Italian Islands
inhabited by Greeks which are
situated in the Aegean between
Greece and Turkey, two countries
almost certain to join the Allies if
the war spread to southeastern Eu-
rope. Another ally, Great Brit-
ain, is taking the highest precau-
tion as tension heightened in the
Mediterranean.

No extensive information has
been given out on the event lead-
ing up to the Allied withdrawal in
southern Norway. The communi-
ques of the British War Office were
understatements. They made no
claims of successes, but gave the
information that there was no in-
formation of any source as to the
number of troops the Germans were
using in the northern advance and
the nature of the equipment they
were able to haul over the rugged
country.

It is clear that the German army,
apart from the political crimes as-
sociated with the invasion, ac-
complished a march which was a
technical brilliant but the Ger-
man communiques were so full of
exaggerated claims of various kinds
that the actual achievements of the
troops were obscured.

The political consequences of the
setback will not be known until
later. It is clear that the British Parlia-
ment holds an inquiry. There were
no indications that anything in the
way of a substantial revolt against
Mr. Chamberlain's leadership was
apparent. But the failure of the
campaign stolely and with deter-
mination to do better from now on.

Glancing back 25 years: Ger-
many launched numerous at-
tacks on the Allied lines in the
Ypres sector in the week of April
28-May 4, 1915. Poison gas was
used when wind conditions were
favorable. But the drive on the
tunnel ports failed, so strong was
the Allied defence after the en-
emy's initial success in the second
outlet of Ypres, April 22-23.

John Allan Macdonald was born
at Rock Barra, Kings County,
Prinace Edward Island, in 1872, son
of Ronald and Sarah Macdonald,
and in his boyhood years received
his elementary education in the
little country school, going from
there to Prinace of Wales College,
Charlottetown, from which institu-
tion he graduated with honors at
the age of 16. He then taught in a
country school for five years.

Mr. Macdonald was at St. Dun-
stan's College in the capacity of
student assistant teacher, 1894-97.
Graduated with B. A. degree in
1897. Principal of Montague gram-
mar school, 1898-1901, appointed to
the staff of Prinace of Wales Col-
lege in 1901, serving there for eight
years, teaching English, Latin and
French. While there he obtained
the leave of absence to spend a year
at Harvard University, obtaining
that institution the degree of
M. A. Appointed to the staff of the
University of Saskatchewan in 1910
