It will be noticed that British Columbia, Manitoba and Ontario show a crime record above the average for Canada. The remarkable figures relate to the Maritime Provinces, where the Scott Act is in force in most countries, but especially Prince Edward Island, the only Province in the Dominion with provincial prohibition. Ontario's crime ratio for 10,000 of the population shows a gradual increase.

Sally's young lady was one of the most unpleasant and dangerous experience on North-western Street a week ago last evening when for a time it was feared that eight or nine persons would lose their lives through the party had set out for Cape Torment in a motor boat in the morning for Prince Edward Island and, having reached the Island safely, had spent the day there. The trip was made about half past seven in the evening. When some distance from the Island shore it was found that the water was very rough and some difficulty was met with in the management of the boat. Finally, the boat began to take in water rapidly and despite energetic bailing such quantities were shipped that it was impossible to keep the engine running. The boat was tossed about and some of those on board held their breath for a few minutes. The boat had neither sails nor oars and without motive power there was grave danger. Fortunately however, the strong wind was blowing in the Island shore and about midnight the party was able to get back to the Island in another direction. The experience, unpleasant and dangerous as it was, would undoubtedly have had more serious results. The party reached Cape Torment again some hours after the second landing on the Island.
