Kaufman Takes Prompt Action

LEGAL ACTION INSTANTLY QUEUED UP FOR ALLEGED INFRINGEMENT OF DESIGN

Important legal action has been instituted by a Kitchener in Montreal against a Montreal manufacturer of buckles. The outcome of the case will be awaited with great interest throughout Canada. The Montreal Rubber Company has filed an application in the Exchequer Court against the Miner Rubber Company of Montreal, seeking an injunction restraining the latter company from manufacturing and selling certain designs of buckles of which the plaintiffs are the originators. It is further alleged that the defendant has registered with the government the designs of the plaintiffs under the Industrial Designs Act.

On March 1924 the Kaufman Rubber Company introduced an improved design of buckle. The new design was introduced in order to protect the plaintiff's design from being copied by other manufacturers. Breaks The Rules

Trainers for a long time have insisted that the proper way to run is on the ball of the feet. This method was thought to insure the highest speed and the greatest conservation of energy. But like the ancient Greeks, the North American Indians and all the Finns, Nurmri runs flatfooted. He says that his countrymen run thus because running with them is a national recreation, not a professional, peculiarly. A toe runner exhausts his vitality, while a flat-footed runner may keep on winning races for years," he says. His knee action is also much higher than the critics like. They believe that there is a maximum being above which the knee cannot be raised without waste effort. Nurmri's knees go much above this maximum. Nor does Nurmri's style bear out the long-cherished belief that a runner can vastly increase the power of his legs by swinging his arms in one of two or three carefully specified ways. Nurmri swings his arms in none of these ways, but carelessly from side to side in a manner that pains the old students of running form.

His Own Pacemaker.

The "running angle" is another two-sun theory of which he has never heard. This detail of form means that the runner can attain greater speed with less effort if the body is bent forward. Nurmri, on the contrary, holds himself very erect. As he flies over the track his body is almost perpendicular to the ground. It seems that Nature has been so generous with this extraordinary man in the quality of his muscles, the circulation of his blood and the power of his lungs and his ability to throw off the poisons of fatigue that he can afford to despise all the little tricks of the game that experience has taught the professors of it. His youthful training was not better calculated to make him a champion than the training of thousands of other Finnish boys. What others do does not interest him; not even what they are doing in a race against him. Nurmri is never racing others. He is racing himself, or his best previous record. That is why in the many races he has engaged in on this continent his opponents have never been able to jockey him into defeat. Instinct tells him the pace he has to travel to win, and this pace he travels without regard to the pace of those about him, or, rather, behind him.
