

BALKAN WAR IS NOW LIKELY TO BE RESUMED WITHIN 96 HOURS

SUPREME COURT NOW IN SESSION IN CHARLOTTETOWN

Chief Justice Presiding—Fairly Large Docket. Grand Jury Return True Bills in Two Cases

The Hilary term of the Supreme Court opened in Charlottetown yesterday. His lordship Chief Justice Sullivan presiding.

The docket is a fairly large one and includes two criminal cases, four civil non-jury cases, ten civil jury cases, and one absent debtor case. The Grand Jury found a true bill against W. L. Phillips for an escape from Queen's County Jail and also against Arthur Mutch, Clifton, Lot 44 for nuisance, the charge against the latter being using offensive manure on his land.

PARLIAMENT REASSEMBLES

OTTAWA, Jan. 14.—Parliament re-assembled to-day and a long and strenuous session is looked for. The naval bill will have precedence, being the principal and most important item in the government's program.

The government in presenting the bill is simply carrying out its announced program in the constitutional way and the present appropriation of thirty-five millions designed to be the immediate need of the mother country is not a policy requiring submission to the people. When a permanent policy is evolved the ministry is pledged to allow the country to pronounce upon it. At present that step is unnecessary.

There is no disposition to worry over the situation which is now in prospect. If by any chance the opposition should determine on sustained resistance of the naval bill the government side is quite prepared to meet them and fight it, backed as they feel they are by the great strength of public sentiment. It is anticipated that there will be much talk but that in the end the bill will go through both houses unamended.

The program suggests a long session, apart from the naval bill the main estimates are to be presented, possibly on Tuesday, the banking bill proceeded with, highways bill re-acted, railway act revised, liberal provision made for agricultural education, both in the provinces and other minor measures dealt with. The budget speech will not be delivered before the latter part of February and apart from certain adjustments necessitated by the West Indian trade agreement, there is no reason to anticipate extensive changes. The general outlook however, is for a long and strenuous session, extending well into the spring.

SENDING AID TO POLE EXPLORERS

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 12.—The Norwegian Government has guaranteed the expenses of a relief expedition to Spitzbergen for the German explorers under Lieut. Schroder Stranz, who started out last year in the steamer Herges Ernest, and are reported to be in dire straits. Manager Mansfield of an American coal company at Green Harbor, tried to organize a relief party, but found the conditions rendered sending succor to the explorers from his country impossible.

The last advices from the expedition came recently from Capt. Ritzschel, who reached Advent Bay in a deplorable condition and seeking aid. He said the condition of the expedition was most serious. Lieut. Schroder Stranz and two companions had not been heard of since August 15, when they left the remainder of the party for a sledge journey.

GERMAN LINER BREAKS SHAFT

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Agents of the North German Lloyd received a wireless message from S. S. Grosser Kururst, via Cape Race, saying that she had broken her port crank shaft yesterday while about 560 miles east of Cape Race. Because of the accident the vessel is proceeding at half speed and will not reach here probably until Friday next. Normal she would have come into port next Tuesday. The Grosser Kururst left Bremen, January 4. She was to have sailed from New York for Panama January 16, on a cruise, for which nearly 400 passengers have been booked. This cruise has now been abandoned as it will take at least ten days to make necessary repairs to the ship.

FIVE CARS GO OVER TRESTLE

ST. JOHN, Jan. 13.—When five cars loaded with stone toppled over the breakwater at Courtenay Bay, a workman was carried over with them and fell nearly twenty-five feet into a few feet of water. He was only slightly injured. The cars were quite badly damaged but were hoisted back to the trestle within two hours.
