YORK S. S. CONVENTION.

The Sunday School Convention of the York District was held at the Harrington Presbyterian Church commencing at 2.30 p. m. on Thursday, August 10th 1905. Rev. Mr. Archibald, Field Secretary for P. E. I. conducted the Devotional exercises, at the close of which the District President Lemuel Foster took the chair and the business session was opened. Owing to the unavoidable absence of the Secretary, Rev Mr. Miller was elected Secretary. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved off. The roll call was then called to which the following schools responded: York school, 3 delegates, Brackley Point Road, 2 delegates, Union Road, 1 delegate, Stanhope, 1 delegate, Winsloe South, 3 delegates, Highfield 1 delegate, Marshfield 1 delegate, Harrington, 3 delegates, Heartz's Hall, 2 delegates. There were present five superintendents and eight teachers. It was carried upon motion that the President appoint a committee to appoint officers for the ensuing year. The following form the committee appointed: Charles Bryanton, Mr. McCallum and James Matthews. This committee was requested to report at the opening of the ensuing session. The officers to be elected were President, Vice Pres. Sec. Treas. The financial report was then asked for but there was no response excepting from Marshfield and they reported a collection of \$2. Business being finished, Miss Hamilton, a Kindergarten teacher from Dartmouth, delivered an able and interesting address upon the reign of Josiah, VII. Chron. 34. 1. 25.—At the close of the above address it was moved that the present session be adjourned at 5 o'clock. The session concluded by an excellent black board address by Rev. Mr. Archibald, subject—"How to use your lesson helps", Hymn No. 51 was sung and the benediction pronounced after which the meeting adjourned.

The evening session of the above Convention was held in the same place at 7.30 p. m. Meeting was opened by the singing of the Doxology and the Hymn "Blest be the tie that binds." Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Miller. Psalm No. 121 was then sung after which the minutes of the afternoon session were read and adopted.

The nominating committee then gave their report as follows:—
Pres.—Mr. Matthews.
Vice Pres.—Charles Bryanton.
Sec.—Treas.—L. Foster.
Mr. Foster objected on the ground that he had many similar offices and little time, whereupon Beatrice Connolly, Royalty was nominated. The report of the nominating committee was then adopted. The ex-President Mr. Foster then called upon Mr. Matthews to take the chair and welcomed him to his new office with most appropriate remarks. Mr. Matthews called upon Miss Hamilton to address the audience upon "Christ as a Teacher", which she did in a very able manner. Psalm No. 86 was then sung. An address was given by Miss Pierce based chiefly upon her own personal experience as a teacher. This interesting address was very much enjoyed by all. Collection was taken up while the choir favored the company with music.

Rev. Mr. Spencer being absent Rev. Mr. Archibald addressed the meeting upon the subject—"The Sunday School, What is it? What is its object? This address was ably delivered and the audience was deeply interested throughout. Two verses of hymn No. 301 were then sung. It was moved and seconded that a vote of thanks be conveyed to the people of Harrington for their kind hospitality, also moved and seconded that a vote of thanks be tendered Miss Hamilton and Miss Pierce for their able and interesting addresses. These motions were unanimously carried. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Foster for the able and efficient manner in which he filled the office of President for three years. Motion was carried. Mr. Foster replied in appropriate terms. Two verses of hymn 586 were sung. Benediction was then pronounced by Rev. Mr. Archibald thus closing this grand, interesting and very profitable S. S. Convention.

THE LAVOLTA.
