The order of Jack Riggs, barber, for \$1.50 worth of shaves, hair cuts and shampoos has been added to The Guardian Man's number for this week.

The following despatch sent from Sydney appears in the Moncton Times of the 7th inst: It is stated on good authority here that Mr. Y. C. Campbell, district superintendent of the Oxford and Sydney district, has been transferred to the P. E. Island road, and that the district offices at New Glasgow will be transferred here. Investigation of the matter by The Guardian fails to discover any foundation for the rumor.

The mail which Saturday's Guardian announced as having left Pt. du Chene by the S.S. Empress at 8 p. m. on Friday, arrived in Charlottetown by freight train from Summerside at 3.45 p. m. on Saturday. The Empress steamed from Summerside and got to Charlottetown many hours before the mail arrived. The S.S. Northumberland, which arrived in this city from Pictou at 3 p. m. Saturday brought the Nova Scotia mail. Both these steamers have now made their last trips this season on their respective routes and have been laid up for the winter. The Government winter steamers will now take up the transportation service between the Island and the mainland. The Mirlo is on the Pictou-Charlottetown route, brought mail to this city yesterday, and the Stanley goes on the Summerside-Pt. du Chene route, making her first trip today.

JAMES YATES, an old and respected resident of Pownal, was in Charlottetown on Saturday. The occasion of his visit was a particularly happy one, and a matter of pride to the old gentleman, inasmuch as it marked the successful accomplishment of his application to the British Government for a pension in reward for military services rendered by him. The application was made through Lieutenant Governor McKinnon, and though the negotiations took a long time, perseverance was finally rewarded. The pension was allowed, and on Saturday a cheque for the sum due for back pension and the current instalment was received by Mr. Yates. On the 18th May, 1864, at the age of 17 years and a half Mr. Yates enlisted, in his navy town of Belfast, in the 62nd Regiment of Foot. This was only a few weeks after the Crimean War had been declared by Great Britain and France against Russia. In the following year he accompanied his regiment to the Crimea and passed through the dreary and hazardous risks of the siege of Sebastopol. For his military service in the field he received the British and Turkish medals. He served fifteen years with his regiment and was with it in Halifax and Newfoundland. On his discharge he served further with the Royal Canadian Regiment of Rifles, and put a good many of his years of his life into military service. He has been settled in Pownal for over a score of years, where he and his family enjoy the esteem of all their acquaintances.
