CAPTAIN NICOL MARTIN OF GLENDALE, SKYE

An Appreciation

The news of the death of Nicol Martin, of Glendale, was received with unfeigned regret all over Skye and especially in the north, with which he was more intimately connected.

His life was an active one. He was a member and chairman of most of the local Councils, and member of the County Council and Education Authority, and was ever ready to champion by deeds and words which he fearlessly hurled across the Council table at his opponents.

He was the youngest member of the family of the Rev. Angus Morrison, of Skye—five sons and three daughters. Mr. Martin married the elder daughter of MacLeod of MacLeod, 23rd Chief of Dunvegan, and leaves a son, Nicol, and two daughters. At the funeral there was a large concourse of people, all the principal families of Skye being represented.

The Funeral

The remains of Captain Nicol Martin were carried from Husabost House to Glendale burial ground, where the interment took place. There was an unusually large gathering. The pall-bearers were:—Mr. Norman Martin (son), Colonel Iain Martin (son), Mr. MacDonald, Tote House, Skisort; Major Hilleary, Edinbane; Mr. K. MacLeod of Greshornish; Rev. H. MacLean, Broadford; Colonel Campbell, Skye.

A religious service was conducted at Husabost House, in English and Gaelic. Rev. Mr. MacKinnon, parish minister, and Rev. Mr. Morrison, Free Church minister, took part in the English service. Rev. Mr. Colquhoun, Free Presbyterian minister, and Mr. MacAskill, missionary, conducted the Gaelic service. Rev. H. MacLean, engaged in prayer at the cemetery, Oban Times, March 30, 1935.

The late Capt. Nicol Martin was a cousin of Mrs. E. S. MacLeod of this City.

DENOUNCES EDITOR OF LIBERAL PRESS

Hon. Dr. Manion Roundly Charges Winnipeg Paper With Falshood.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 16.—Emphatic refusal to withdraw statements he had made yesterday concerning the editor of the Winnipeg Free Press was the reply today by Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways, when requested by Liberal leader Mackenzie King to make a retraction. The Minister declared John W. Dafoe, editor of the Free Press, had "consistently falsified the record" and "lied" about him.

"I don't intend to allow the editor of this paper or anyone else to call me a traitor to my country," said Dr. Manion. "I don't intend to retract anything."

Fear Strike Following Cut In Coal Price

Garland, Bow River, Alta., farm member, today told the House of Commons he had been informed there was danger of an outbreak among coal miners in the Luscar and Mountain Park mines if any economies were effected at their expense in reduction of prices.

Mr. Garland said he had received information that the Canadian National Railways recently reduced the price they offer for coal by 50 cents a ton.

Dr. Manion said he would direct the attention of the C. N. R. management to Mr. Garland's question and ask for an explanation.

Fails To Set Transcontinental Air Record

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) ALAMOSA, Col., April 16.—Laura Ingalls landed at the Alamosa airport at five P. M. (seven P. M. E. S. T.) today, ending an attempt to break the non-stop transcontinental air record for women.

The diminutive flier left Los Angeles for New York at 5:10 a. m. P. C. T., (8:10 a. m., E. S. T.), in her black monoplane in an attempt to lower Amelia Earhart's record of 17 hours, seven minutes and 40 seconds.

The flier told airport attendants she became lost in intense dust clouds and was unable to find her bearings for some time.

Gloucester Skipper Dies

Missionary Conditions In China Improved

By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 16.—Conditions affecting Canadian missionaries in Szechwan Province, China, have improved since the first week in April when uneasiness was caused by the activities of Communist forces in the northeastern border of the province, according to a cablegram from Rev. G. S. Bell, Chengtu, to Rev. James Endicott, Secretary of the United Church's board of foreign missions here.

"We are keeping closely in touch with our West China mission in Szechwan," said Dr. Endicott. "There is nothing in the message which we received to indicate prospects were worse this month than several times during the last year in that area. There is every indication that for the first time in 20 years the central government of China is established in the province. Local troops alone held the Communists in check last year and have recently been heavily re-

inforced by troops from other provinces."

Early in the winter the mission decided to purchase a truck. This has now been brought across the province to Chengtu, giving rise to unfounded reports of an alarmist nature, Dr. Endicott added.

King Protests Shooting Of Pet Pigeons

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 16.—Liberal leader Mackenzie King today took time out from his parliamentary duties to telephone Mayor P. J. Nolan and protest vigorously that some person was shooting his pet pigeons near Laurier House, official residence of the Liberal party head.

Mayor Nolan asked Chief of Police Joliat to investigate the complaint and learned a police officer is authorized to shoot pigeons if residents complain they are a nuisance. The Chief expressed doubt that any policeman had shot the birds near Laurier House.

VICE-REGAL PARTY RETURNS TO OTTAWA

Capital Eagerly Awaiting Finals Of Dominion Drama Festival.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 16.—The Governor-General, the Countess of Bessborough and Lady Moyra Ponsonby returned to Ottawa today after completing a farewell tour of Western Canada. Their return was expected by Ottawa, which has been quiet almost ever since they left.

Their Excellencies were accompanied on their tour by Mark Baring, the Governor-General's nephew; A. F. Lascelles, the Earl's Secretary; and Capt. D. Adams, aide-de-camp. Ottawa brightened at the prospect of viewing next week performances of plays being presented at the finals of the Dominion Drama Festival, which will start Monday night and continue till Saturday night. Numerous out-of-town dramatic teams will compete in the festival which was inaugurated in 1932 largely through the efforts of the Earl of Bessborough.

The city's biggest party was held last Wednesday night when Liberal members of the House of Commons claimed a Scottish descent staged their annual dinner, ate haggis and heard the skirl of the pipes. Chairman of the event was William Duff, Antigonish-Guysborough in a name who is known as the "Admiral on Parliament Hill."

CHARGES AGAINST U. S. SECRETARY OF LABOR

SANTA MONICA, Calif., April 17.—Frances Perkins, United States Secretary of Labor, was accused by a speaker at a convention of women's clubs here with being "not in the least interested in the cause of women."

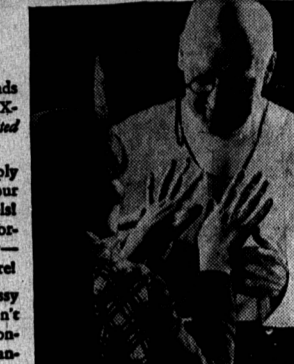
The charge was made by Mrs. Anne Leidendecker, president of the Los Angeles district, California Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.
