The afternoon meeting opened with Mrs. Walter Shaw in the chair. After the Club Women's Creed, the fifty members present joined heartily in singing "O Canada." Mrs. Turner gave the address of welcome, in which she stated that all were welcome to Long Creek. She hoped that much good might come of this Convention. Mrs. Wm. Mutch replied. strong opinion of the meeting. After a short intermission during which a lunch was served, Miss Flynn, Milliner from Charlottetown, demonstrated on hat-making. Dr. Tidmarsh stressed the fact that a Sanatorium for T. B. patients was needed on Prince Edward Island. Why is it that on Prince Edward Island the death rate from T. B. is 100 persons a year while in Ontario it is 71? We on P. E. I. are not willing to pay for the Health of our people. T. B. is record as favoring the building of a Provincial Sanatorium by the Government of this Province, and if funds for such erection and equipment are not available, that a special Health Assessment be levied for this purpose. Be it further resolved that we place ourselves on record as being prepared to assist in equipping this Institution, or helping its operation in every possible manner. Signed..... NOVEMBER 1st, 1928. WHEREAS the death rate from Tuberculosis in Prince Edward Island has reached alarming proportions, removing from our midst the very flower of our citizens, and WHEREAS this disease is not only the cause of great loss of life but great unhappiness and loss of efficiency in our men and women. WHEREAS there are no adequate facilities for the care and treatment of tubercular patient in this province, and WHEREAS tubercular institutions in other provinces are being filled to capacity by patients from these provinces, thus preventing our sick from gaining entrance, and WHEREAS if such admittance is occasionally gained, the cost is so great as to be almost prohibitive. Be it therefore resolved that the Women's Institutes in convention at Long Creek, on this first day of November, do place themselves on record as favoring the building of a Provincial Sanatorium by the Government of this Province, and if any government, who places a tax on the people for public health, Mr. Stretch said that also known that if a woman will she will, even though when she won't she won't. EGGS FROM AUSTRALIA AND AFRICA TO BRITAIN Eggs from Australia and South Africa are being sold in increasing quantities in London and the provinces, says the London Daily Mail. They are almost indistinguishable from English fresh eggs, in spite of their journey of thousands of miles. Both the Australian and South African governments have strict regulations for the grading and packing of the eggs, and every case is inspected before it is shipped. During the voyage the eggs are not put in freezing chambers, but currents of cool air pass through the holds. According to the ruling of the International Congress of Chefs, a new laid egg remains such until it is from 10 to 12 days old.
