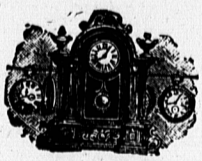

GET RICH QUICK SHELDON IS GIVEN FIVE YEARS' TERM

MONTREAL, June 16--The culmination in the great Sheldon drama was reached this morning in the court of special sessions when Justice Langelier meted out a five year sentence to Charles D. Sheldon, the man whose financial exploits dazzled all Canada. The charge upon which he was sentenced was theft of \$15,000. Other charges of securing money under false pretences, will be held in abeyance. Justice Langelier in announcing his decision said that he found Sheldon guilty under a section of the criminal code which provides a penalty for unlawful conversion. Sheldon heard the verdict calmly.

Before being sentenced he pleaded for clemency on account of his advanced years, asking that the sentence be made as short as possible in order that he might be able to pay back the money he had taken. "To this purpose," he declared, "I intend to devote the balance of my declining years, and they will be all too few for the purpose."

About three years ago he came to Montreal and started operating in a small way in a bucket shop. His eloquence started him giving lectures to Y. M. C. A., youths over a St. Catharines street. The youths fell for it, and entered into "investments" Sheldon did so well with these sums that more money came rolling in. He set up with desk room in an office on St. Francis Xavier street and began to advertise in a quiet way. Twenty per cent a month was what he claimed to pay by beating the market.

Newspapers began to question Sheldon's profits. Here it was where the wizard showed his persuasive powers. In the face of a battering, coming opposition, he was able to talk his victims round so well, that money poured in by the hundreds of thousands.

One day he took in \$375,467, but on the other hand the public got frightened. After advertising in a quiet way, Sheldon found he could not stem the tide. He disappeared.

On Columbus Day, October 13, 1910 the New York market was closed. Sheldon's place of business was also closed. A meat sign on the door said it was closed for Columbus Day, and that it would re-open on tomorrow.

IS NOT OBLIGED TO PAY INSURANCE.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 16--According to a decision handed down by the supreme court of errors yesterday, the Ancient Order of United Workmen are not obliged to pay an insurance policy of a member who ceases in the liquor business.

John Burns, of Waterbury, after becoming a member of the order, engaged in the liquor business and paid his premiums regularly. At his death the order refused to pay the \$2,000 policy he carried, on the ground that he was a liquor dealer, and according to laws of the order such a person could not carry life insurance. The case was taken to the superior court, where the order was upheld, and on appeal the supreme court sustained the lower court.

BILL AGAINST ABSINTHE.

PARIS, June 16--The senatorial committee today approved the La Marzelle bill, prohibiting the fabrication and sale of absinthe. Statistics show that in 1873, 147,688 gallons of absinthe were consumed in France. In 1900 the consumption had jumped to 5,246,274, but decreased to 3,786,552 in 1910.

STEPHEN LEACOCK'S NEW BOOK

There has just appeared from the Publishers Press, Ltd., a handsome cloth bound volume of some 230 pages containing Stephen Leacock's "NON-SENSE NOVELS."

We may not perhaps all agree on the rightness or wrongness of Mr. Leacock's views when he speaks as a professor of political economy, but of his little to his place as the foremost humorist in Canada, there can be no doubt. Genuine, downright fun, without malice or offence, is a rare article and Mr. Leacock seems able to supply it from the bubbling source of an inspiration that never grows stale. The book consists of a collection of mock-heroic stories in which sense and nonsense are mingled together in a happy combination which shows that after all humankind is one of the best vehicles for the presentation of ideas. The author disclaims any high purpose for his work. He feels that as a professor of political economy he is guilty of a serious fall from the dignity of his occupation in assuming the cap and bells to the public. He offers his books to the public, he writes, in his preface, without apology, and is willing to admit that as a teacher of the most dismal science, he ought to know better. He will be consoled, however, he tells the reader in the charming little preface to which above refers, if his book should bring some passing amusement for an idle hour or some brief respite when the sadness of the mind or the suffering of the body forbid the pursuit of wretched things.

It speaks well for the world wide appreciation which the Canadian writers are receiving that Mr. Leacock's book, is being published simultaneously in three separate editions in London, New York and Canada. The English and American editions are published by the well-known firm of John Lane. The Publishers Press, Limited, of Montreal, have secured the entire rights for the Canadian edition. The book is expected to run into many thousands in the first few weeks of its sale.

WILL SUPPLY MONTREAL FIRE CHIEFS WITH AUTOS.

MONTREAL, June 16--Seven autos are to be supplied to the district fire chiefs. This has been done upon the strong recommendation of Chief Tremblay, who declares that horse-flesh was no longer able to cope with the demands of the department. 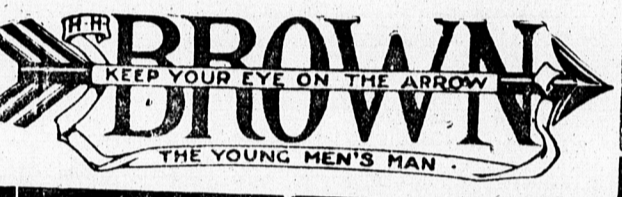
