West Point Ferry Service May Be Delayed

It is quite possible that the proposed West Point-Buctouche ferry service will not go into operation before the spring of 1948. Mr. Sanford Phillips of O'Leary, president of West Point Ferries Ltd., said yesterday, although he still expressed hope that it can be commenced this Fall. He had been asked to comment on a current report that the service could not possibly start this year. Previous announcements have expressed hope that operations would commence for Old Home Week.
