EARNEST ATTENTION

The citizens' meeting at the Market Hall last evening was largely attended, orderly and well-conducted. His Lordship briefly reviewed the work of the late Council and the state of the finances. Nevertheless, immense crowds stood along the streets and cheered the procession, which consisted of five carriages and an escort of Household Cavalry, as it passed slowly toward the city.
