The death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Ann Field, widow of the late Joseph B. Field. Her funeral will take place from her late residence Bayfield Street on Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock, the Rev. M. Marshall officiating.

Messrs Prowse, Duffy and Batt, athletes from this City who competed at the Maritime Championships at Halifax on Saturday arrived home last night. It seems as if there was some feeling that the referee was at fault in deciding against Prowse as the following reference shows: "The bicycle races were uninteresting and should in future be eliminated from the program. John McKenna, of Sydney, won the half and the mile bicycle race. The latter race was unsatisfactory. But fell and McKenna went over him, the referee at first awarding the race to George Prowse, of the V. A. A., with L. Hulley second. These riders were in no way responsible for the accident. Later on McKenna protested, the Referee changed his decision, and as the other riders declined to race over again, McKenna was sent the mile, which he covered in 2:30.45 and he was awarded the race."

Speaking of H. E. White's race on Saturday at Halifax, the Halifax Chronicle says: "The record, 2:07.8, was held by George Tracey, and it has stood for eighteen years. White is a powerful runner, and one of the best athletes sent out from the Island in recent years. It was mainly due to Ross of the Wanderers that the record was broken. He set the pace from the start, and covered the first quarter in 53 seconds. Ross led a little the way until within 20 yards of the finish, when he weakened and almost collapsed, but was game and managed to breast the tape. White took the lead when Ross fell back, and won by a couple of yards. When it was announced that the record was lowered, White was liberally applauded. The Wanderers' sprinters had it all their own way in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, F. Schaefer winning both events, with E. W. Schaefer second. Both ran in fine form. H. E. White won the 440 yards dash with lots to spare, and E. W. Schaefer took the hurdle race."

The Catholic Church Extension Society of America of which R. F. C. Kelly, LL. B., form of this City, is President, has established in perpetuity ten scholarships at St. Dunstan's College for the education of deserving young men, who desire to study for the priesthood. These scholarships entitle their holders to free board and tuition during their course at St. Dunstan's College, and at whatever Seminary they may be placed to pursue their theological studies. This Society was organized upwards of two years ago, mainly through the efforts of Father Kelly for the purpose of building and equipping churches for the use of Catholics in the sparsely settled districts of the United States. It has already collected and disbursed upwards of one hundred thousand dollars. The education of young men for the priesthood, will, in future be one of the prominent features of its work. After ordination the young priests will be called upon to do missionary work in whatever diocese there is most need of their labor. This year the following young men have secured these scholarships: Arsen J. Arsenault, Mt. Carmel; Raphael McKinnon, St. Peter's Bay; John McDonnell, Little Pond; Joseph J. Steele, Little Pond; Alphonse D. Dagle, Rollo Bay; Vincent Fisher, Scotch Fort; J. Nelson Barry, Roxbury, Mass.; John J. McKinnon, St. Peter's Bay; John L. Kennedy, Souris West; Bradford McNeil, Summerside.
