The fry was secured by the Fisheries department here, thro Mr Holroyd from Newcastlle, N. B., and there have been ten loads deposited in P. E. I. inland waters this season. Four were placed in the Baker River, two in the North River, one in Winter River and three in Morell River. Eight more loads will be distributed; mainly through the western part of the province and some in rivers in Coleman and Freetown.

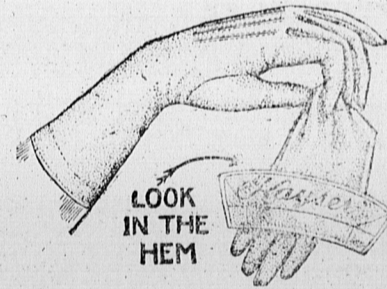
