In addition to six black ducks the boat held four Hudsonian Godwits and two red foxes. Godwit are a species of shore bird almost as large as Ouzel and are extremely rare. Earlier in the week a resident of Ellerslie was fined \$10.00 and costs for hunting on Sunday. The cases were investigated and prosecuted by the R.C.M. Police.

R.C.A.F. Station At Summerside Inspected

The R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, was inspected yesterday by Col. Basil B. Campbell, assistant Deputy Minister of National Defence and a party of Ottawa officials and senior R.C.A.F. officers. They were touring various R.C.A.F. establishments to familiarize members of various departments with local conditions in the field, to inspect the condition of plants and carry out certain ground planning. The party was escorted around the station by Squadron Leader W.C. Langstaff, D.F.C., commanding officer and Squadron Leader W.S. Gillis, chief instructor. They looked over the site where the proposed married quarters will be built, went through the station buildings to see what repairs are necessary and inspected the work that is being done in lengthening and recapping the runways. In regard to the runways it was decided to give further reconsideration to the concrete buttens that are to be built so as to make sure that they are long enough that jet planes can take off in formation. They expressed themselves as being very pleased with the progress of the work on the runways that is being carried on by Curran and Briggs, Ltd. When they return to Ottawa they will make recommendations as to interior repairs on the buildings and it is expected that the work will be done this coming winter. It is also expected that a start will be made early in the spring on the buildings that are to be built for married personnel. The party had lunch in the mess and left shortly after for Chatham, N.B. and the Mermaids," which opened yesterday at the Capitol Theatre with Johnny Weissmuller again in the role of Edgar Rice Burroughs' immortal ape-man and with Brenda Joyce once more portraying Jane. This time Tarzan's adventures bring him into contact with a tribe of amphibious coastal natives, a plot device which gives full scope to Weissmuller's championship swimming abilities. His underwater rescue of the mermaid heroine and his submerged struggles with an octopus and with a gang of desperate armed natives are thrill episodes. The numerous aquatic scenes make the film very different from its predecessors, but the chimpanzee, Cheta's, haunting, and Jane's loyalty remain constant. Linda Christian, featured as chief "mermaid," seeking to escape from the brutal white trader who poses as the native's god, and John Lawrenz as a comic singing jungle possum, are excellent in their roles. Edward Ashby, Fernando Wagner, George Zucco and Gustavo Rojo stand out among the supporting players. Robert Florey has directed the picture with full appreciation of its dramatic value.
