Huge Coal Deposits In Great Britain

LONDON, July 4.—(Reuters)—Beneath the soil of the United Kingdom lie 20,000,000,000 tons of coal enough to keep the collieries of Britain in full employment until July 1, 2040.

This is disclosed in an appraisal of coal reserves and production issued today by the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, which says that "so far as the classification of reserves is concerned we can see our way clearly for 100 years and for a further 75 years less clearly."

The report says the general position of Britain's fuel supplies gives no cause for alarm. "The reserves of the various kinds of coals of coal appear to be adequate to meet the demands hereof until a revolutionary change."

Reserves of a further 16,000,000,000 tons of coal "have been noted while collecting the main data," the report says. This figure is above the 20,000,000,000 tons estimated as the total planned output for the 100 years ending 2040.

Wider use of mechanical methods of mining and proposed reorganization of the industry including the concentration of output in fewer units may affect relative ratios of production in different districts, the report, but these changes "will not seriously affect the overall picture."

The report shows that the bulk concentrated in South Wales and the Lancashire, Midlands, Northumberland and Scottish coal fields.

CANADIANS EXEMPTED

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (CP)—An order-in-council has been passed in New Zealand exempting residents of Canada from liability to pay income tax in New Zealand as non-resident traders. This measure accords similar exemptions from income tax granted to New Zealanders conducting business as non-resident traders in Canada.
