### THE KILLED IN CANADIANS NOW NUMBER 123

**OTTAWA, March 2.**—The list of casualties among the Canadian contingent announced during the night bears grim testimony to the participation of our troops in the line, and by now the whole division is thought to be engaged. The fatal casualties up to date number 123. This includes those who died at Salisbury Plain as well as the men of the Princess Patricia's and the regular division who have been killed in action.

### LETTER FROM FRANCE

The following letter has been written from somewhere in France by Heber Large to his mother in this city:—  
Dear Mother:—I have written once already since I landed and trust you have received letter. Am in the best of health, and I had a grand time on the trip over. We travelled on a cattle train, and the scenery in France is fine although it was rather rough on the trip over. We are within the sound of the guns at the front and can see the flashes at night. We are nicely billeted in a village, and we are all quite comfortable, the grub is good, and we have all kinds of nice warm clothing, so there is really nothing to worry about. The people here are very obliging, and will do almost anything for one. The French prices of grub are very reasonable here. I can't say just when we go to the front, but as we are on the line of communication we will be in no great danger. I can't say very much as our letters will be destroyed we cannot say where we are or anything that might give information to the enemy. Write to all and tell them where I am etc. I will write soon again, but as we are quite busy, I may not get a chance to write often, so if you don't hear from me very regularly you will know I am too busy to write. All the boys are well and happy and enjoying the expedition to every advantage.
