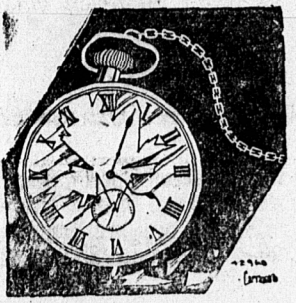

SOME DARING EXPLOITS.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Cherbourg correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company sends the following:—"A Belgian soldier, Emil Sapin, twenty-two years of age, who has arrived here for a few days' rest, is a Chevalier of the Order of Leopold and of the Legion of Honour, as a result of his exploits in the past few days."

Single-handed, Sapin destroyed a German battery, took a Hussar regimental flag, killed the German Colonel and made forty prisoners.

THE ONTARIO PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS TO BE GUARDED.

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—As a precaution against vindictive individuals with German sympathies, the Ontario Government has decided to place two outside guards at the Parliament buildings, and to install a dozen cluster lights to light up the grounds. The guards will constantly patrol the grounds around the buildings at night, and an added watch will be kept inside. Two additional watchmen have been put on.

PREFER MONEY TO CLOTHING.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Lady Jellicoe stated that no appeal to Canada for gifts of clothing for the men of the fleet was being made. Money contributions would be more appreciated, as some of the parcels received contained clothing which could not be offered to any self-respecting man.

WEALTHY BELGIANS SEND \$3,000,000 TO U. S. RELIEF FUND

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The American Commission for Relief in Belgium has received a check on the Bank of England for \$3,000,000, which was contributed by prominent Belgians interested in the relief of their countrymen.

With the emergency work in Belgium well under way, the commission is now prepared to assume the permanent task of keeping Belgians supplied with food. In this connection it has made the following statement:—"The American commission for relief in Belgium to-day received a check for \$3,000,000, which, it is estimated, will be necessary for the transportation of food-stuffs for the next three months from various parts of the world into Belgium. This money has been advanced to the commission under the guarantee given by various Belgian relief committees and important Belgians."

This substantial sum is a most convincing evidence of the desire of the Belgians themselves to assist the commission to the fullest extent which they are capable of doing. The contribution also emphasizes the urgency of the situation and, as large as the sum is, it must be borne in mind that food-stuffs to the value of about \$4,000,000 monthly must be secured for seven or eight months. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 monthly will be required for the expense of transport.

GERMAN OFFICERS ESCAPE ON DUTCH STEAMER AS FIREMEN.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—An official dispatch from Lieutenants Colonel Dirk Vandeweyer, concerning the defeat on November 8th of a force of Germans and Boer rebels at Zandfontein, near the southern border of German South-west Africa, was received here to-day. According to the report the union forces inflicted a loss of 120 killed or wounded, and captured twenty-five men. The union loss was twelve men killed and eleven wounded. "Our officers and men who were killed," the report says, "with some exceptions, were shot with dum-dum bullets and suffered frightful wounds."
