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Lib. Majority Greatly Reduced In Maisonneuve

Stronghold Of Liberalism Returns Party Candidate By Less Than 1,000 Majority, As Against 5,400 Majority In 1930, 10,879 In 1926, And 12,089 In 1921.

MONTREAL, June 28.—(By the Canadian Press)—Joseph Jean, K. C., today retained the constituency of Maisonneuve, on the Island of Montreal, for the Liberal interest. He was elected to the House of Commons, to succeed the late Clement Robitaille, by a majority of approximately 1,000 votes over Jean Fautoux, Conservative. Three other candidates received so few votes that they were no factors in the counting and all three lost their deposits.

GREATLY REDUCED MAJORITY

While Mr. Fautoux was defeated he could point to a greatly reduced

Liberal majority from that received by Mr. Robitaille in 1930. At that time the late member won by 5,400 votes over M. Desjardins, Conservative.

The final result available tonight showed that with five small polls to hear from, the vote was:

Jean Fautoux, Conservative, 14,492.

The number of voters exercising their franchise was approximately equal to those in 1930. Incomplete returns tonight showed 31,872 votes cast while the total vote in the last general election was 33,754.

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Germany Says She Cannot Pay

French Delegation Stiffening In Its Attitude Towards The Germans.

(By George Hamilton, Canadian Press Staff Writer)
LAUSANNE, June 27.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The scene at Lausanne shifted again with a darkening sky as it appeared late tonight that the French delegation was stiffening in its attitude towards the Germans. The latter had notified France today that they could not pay reparations.

After three hours' consultation, the two groups suspended their conversations until Wednesday. Premier Edouard Herriot of France and Chancellor Franz Von Papen of Germany interviewed in turn Premier Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain who subsequently remained in conference with his cabinet colleagues until midnight.

When Count Lutz Von Krook, German Finance Minister, outlined

today the development scheme which Germany offers as a substitute for the eventual resumption of reparations payments desired by France, Premier Herriot received the proposal with reservations "which he judged necessary." Afterwards at an interview with newspapermen from France, he is understood to have declared that the German scheme was inadmissible and that he could not consent to the cancellation of reparations without adequate compensation.

It was noted that when Chancellor Von Papen left French headquarters he was not accompanied to his car by the French Premier as on previous occasions. Germany's willingness to negotiate a trade treaty with France is

Royal, N. B. Electors Answer Mackenzie King By Voting Conservative

Government Policies Indorsed In Re-Election Of Hon. G. B. Jones By Majority Of 588 Over Liberal Opponent.

SUSSEX, N. B., June 27.—(By The Canadian Press)—Hon. G. B. Jones, Conservative, was returned to the House of Commons by a majority of 588 votes as a result of today's by-election in the constituency of Royal. The complete count reported by all polling stations gave Mr. Jones a total of 7,739 votes as compared with 7,151 for his Liberal opponent, Donald V. White.

JONES SWINGS INTO LEAD

Neither candidate had a great advantage over the other as figures were compiled for 35 polls tonight. When 41 polls were heard from, Mr. Jones swung into the lead of 319 and this grew to more than 600 when further figures were reported. Final returns from Queens County, however, put the Conservative majority to 888.

It would be the first time in eight years for one of the Dominion's Davis Cup players to come east.

"Bonus Army" Turns Against Communists

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Communism turned its face toward the U. S. bonus-seekers "Army" today and got it punched.

Troubled with rapidly exhausting food supplies, the veterans refused to worry but again took stern measures to cleanse the ranks of Communist and radical agitators.

Would Seize Jewish Property

BERLIN, June 27.—(A.P.)—In the early hours of Sunday morning when the house was almost empty, the Prussian Diet passed a National Socialist taxation bill which provides, among other things, for the confiscation of the property of all Jews who immigrated from the east after 1914. The measure is simply a recommendation to the Federal Government and has no binding effect. More than anything else it was a demonstration of the anti-semitism of the Nazis.
