TRIENNIAL SESSION OF HIGH COURT C. O. F.

WILL TONIGHT'S GAME DECIDE

The High Court, Independent Order of Foresters, met in triennial session in Castle Hall in this city at 11.15 a. m. on Wednesday, 16th inst.

Rev. E. J. Rattee, High Chief Ranger, presided, and the following officers were present: P. H. C. R.—S. F. Hodgson, H. V. C. R.—H. H. Montgomery, H. Sec'y.—A. D. Fraser, H. Treas.—M. A. Allen, H. Com.—J. F. Whear, H. Aud.—W. A. McLean, H. Org.—John Mollison, H. F. Sec.—P. Murdoch, H. S. W.—E. B. McLaren, H. Mar.—F. L. Rendell, H. Con.—D. McArthur, H. J. B.—J. E. Huestis.

The Committee submitted their report showing a very good attendance of representatives. The officers submitted very satisfactory reports on the state of the Order and on its financial condition.

The High Court Degree was then conferred on quite a large number of delegates from that Degree.

The High Chief Ranger, in a clear and argumentative address reviewed the bearing of the legislation secured at the late session of the Dominion Parliament upon the policies of the membership, especially of those members who joined the Order prior to 1898.

An interesting discussion followed, taken part in by Bros. Anderson, Mollison, Silliphant and Hodgson.

The visitors from the Supreme Court, having failed to make connection with the boat on Tuesday evening, telegraphed that they would not reach here until arrival of mail on Wednesday and requested that preparation be made for a night session.

Consequently the evening session was deferred till 9 p. m. Arrangements were made for refreshments being furnished on the arrival of the representatives of the Supreme Court, who entered the hall at 11 p. m. and, business being suspended for a short time, a pleasant social time was spent, and the representatives had an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the members of the High Court.

Business being resumed, the visiting brethren delivered eloquent and impressive addresses in defence of the impending change in the constitution foreshadowed by the Dominion Act passed at the last session of the Dominion Parliament.

Much further information was elicited by the many questions put by the members. Towards the close of the discussion, which did not close till nearly 3 a. m., it was quite apparent that many members were beginning to realize that some means was necessary to bring the assets and liabilities to approximate, others, however, still held to the opinion that the revenue of the Supreme Court always would be ample to cover its liabilities.

MORNING SESSION. Court met at 9 o'clock Thursday morning; several committees reported and much routine business was transacted, and before adjournment the officers for the ensuing triennial period were elected: H. C. R.—Rev. E. J. Rattee (re-elected).

H. V. C. R.—John Grady, H. Sec'y.—A. D. Fraser (re-elected), H. Treas.—M. A. Allen (re-elected), H. Phy.—W. H. Docherty, M.D., H. Com.—Jno. F. Whear (re-elected).

H. Auditors—I. R. Prowse, W. A. McLean (re-elected). Charlottetown was chosen as the place of meeting for next High Court. Rev. E. J. Rattee, H. C. R., was elected as representative to the Supreme Court, and John Anderson as alternate.

On resuming after recess the following were selected as the appointed officers: H. Organist—Mrs. E. Silliphant, H. S. W.—Thomas McNeill, H. J. W.—E. B. McLaren, H. Mar.—Samuel Elliott, H. Con.—John D. Goss, H. Mes.—D. McArthur, H. S. B.—E. B. McLaren, H. J. B.—Walter Gorrill.

The newly appointed officers were then installed into their respective offices by the Rev. E. J. Rattee, acting as Supreme Chief Ranger, and J. H. Bell and D. P. McNutt, acting as Supreme Marshals.

Consideration of routine business was resumed and the business of the session being concluded, High Court was closed with the regular ritual ceremony.

NOTE. Messrs. Mitchell and Darsch left on Thursday morning to be present at the session of New Brunswick High Court, which is meeting in Moncton on Thursday and Friday.

BOYS' Y. M. C. A. CAMP IN N.S.

On Wednesday evening the Charlottetown boys who have been attending the Maritime boys' camp of the Y. M. C. A., returned home on the Northumberland. There were fourteen in the party as they arrived home.

The camp was held at the permanent camp grounds at Big Cove, Nova Scotia, and camp was under the leadership of Rev. E. W. Forbes, of Sydney. He was assisted by Assistant Secretary McMillan of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A., Physical Director Bank of New Glasgow, and a number of volunteer leaders from the ranks of the young men.

There were seven enrolled at this year's camp, being one more than last year. The boys all returned to their homes in various parts of the Maritime Provinces on Wednesday.

A splendid program of sports was carried out, the Charlottetown boys, as usual, winning their share of the honors. Two of the ten camp pennants were won by the boys from this city.

Mr. McMillan was in charge of the sports and had associated with him several of the boys. An excellent series of events was held both on land and water.

The annual circus was a great success and very favorable comments were heard about some of the side shows. The special nights, when there were stereopticon lectures, camp fires, minstrel show, and other features, kept the boys busy.

Mr. Hyndman, an evangelist from England, helped in the religious work. Forty-eight forward step cards were signed by the campers, and the boys have returned home determined to lead clean lives.

Secretary Reilly, of the Y. M. C. A., crossed over on the boat on Tuesday morning, accompanied by three boys. They cycled across country from Picou Landing to the camp, remaining for the closing day and returning with the balance of the Charlottetown delegation.

The camp was twenty-one years of age this year. The founder of the camp, Mr. E. M. Robinson, now secretary of the International Committee of the Y. M. C. A. for boys' work, was a visitor. In his honor the boys erected a "Cairn" on "Round Top." In it was placed a bottle with the names of every camper enclosed.
