Giants Defeat Cubs 8-5 To Increase League Lead; Grove Blanks Tribe 8-0

NEW YORK, June 9 (CP)—New York Giants, champions of the National League, swept a 1-2 game lead over Chicago Cubs today at Chicago winning the final ball game of their important series 8-5.

The Giants, with the score deadlocked at 5-5, charged home with three runs in the ninth inning to achieve victory, their third over the Cubs in four games.

At Pittsburgh, relief pitcher Mace Brown limited Boston Bees to only two hits in seven innings and hit a scratch single with the game deadlocked and the bases loaded in the sixth to give the Pirates a 5-3 victory and sweep the two-game series.

The win put Pittsburgh in fourth place of the league ahead of Cincinnati.

The Brooklyn-St. Louis game was postponed because of rain.
