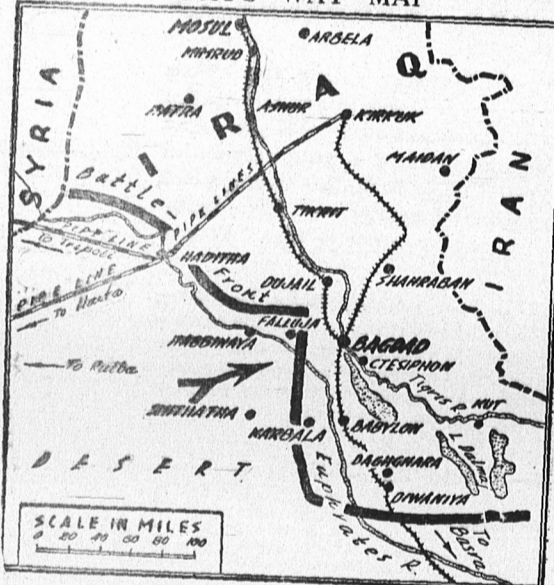

A continuous battlefront in Iraq is non-existent. One has been sketched in on the map in order to suggest the area south and east of it which appears to be largely in the hands of Iraqi troops. The British have just bombed the great oil centre at Mosul, which is evidence enough that that place is not in their possession. The British, Berlin says, also bombed three airbases in French Lebanon which is on the coast just west of the portion of Syria shown on the map. Iraq claims that her troops are taking the offensive near Habbaniya and near Basra which is south of the southeastern corner of area shown on the map.

## Report 40 of Tanker's crew Are prisoners

OTTAWA, May 26 — (CP) — The External Affairs Department announced today receipt of official word from the International Red Cross Committee at Geneva that German authorities have announced 40 members of the crew of the Canadian tanker Canadollite were not captured. The hundred word announcement followed by a list of names, said the 40 crew members had been interned in Freetown. The Canadollite, registered at Montreal, sailed from Freetown, the capital of Sierra Leone in Africa, March 22. External Affairs Department officials said they had been unable to establish the location of Enebec, which did not know whether it was an internment camp or that of some small village. They pointed out the information came from Geneva and there was the possibility there might have been an error in transmission of the name. The Department said next-of-kin of those aboard the Canadollite were asked to communicate with them should address enquiries to the Department of External Affairs at Ottawa. From London today it was reported the Canadollite was feared sunk off the west coast of Africa.

Beef Cattle Prices There has been little change in beef cattle prices during February, March and April, 1941, states the Current Review of Agricultural Conditions in Canada. Normally prices tend to be stronger through the late spring months, reaching a peak in June. The continued strength of the domestic market should more than offset any increase in marketings which are likely to take place. Another factor in the price situation is the export market. Prices in the United States have also shown little variation the past three months, with the tendency to be slightly downward as a result of increased marketings. The tendency towards increased cattle numbers in the United States has been under way for three years and it is expected to continue for at least another two or three years.

## Egypt warns Citizens to leave Syria, Lebanon

CAIRO, May 26 — (AP) — Egypt today warned her citizens living in Syria and Lebanon to come home without delay as reports—still unconfirmed—persisted that the Free French forces of Gen. Charles De Gaulle were marching into Syria from Palestine.

Military sources here said they were unable to confirm the reports of a Free French drive into Syria, as pointed out that with Germany's air troops concentrating their attack on Crete this would be a most opportune time for such action in the Vichy-controlled states of the Levant.

British forces defending Egypt took advantage of this German preoccupation with Crete to step up their air offensive in the western desert.

In 30 hours eight German planes were destroyed, it was announced, while bomb hits caused explosion of an ammunition dump and a gasoline station. At the same time Nazi aviation was described as remaining "strangely inactive" in the desert region.

Main target of the R.A.F. attacks was the concentration of axis forces in the Capuzza-Bardia area, just across the Libyan border from Egypt, where lorries were destroyed and damaged and camp and gun positions heavily bombed.

The R. A. F. also renewed heavy air attacks on Greek airbases where the air-borne assault on Crete is based.

The fighting in Iraq continued. The British command said a raid was made by German bombers on their cantonment at Habbaniyah airbase, west of Baghdad.

Pork Consumption and Bacon Exports The domestic consumption of pork in Canada from all indications has been at a high level in recent months compared with normal requirements, states the May issue of the Current Review of Agricultural Conditions in Canada. Despite the present high level of hog production, the high rate of domestic consumption, coupled with the movement of hogs and products to the United States, made it somewhat difficult to secure sufficient export bacon to fill the or signal contract requirements of eight million pounds weekly to Great Britain, plus the recent additional requests of 28 million pounds for the year. However, the increase in export bacon prices announced on May 2 would overcome this difficulty and may be expected to stimulate hog production during 1942, because of the resulting improvement in the hog feed ratio.
