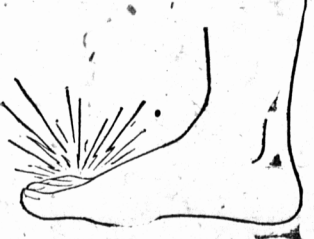

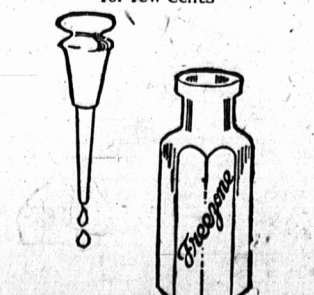
"Please don't send a doctor to me, Everett. I won't cry any more. I guess I am lonely. You haven't been with me very much since we came back, you know."

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION TO REV. P. S. DUFFY

On Saturday evening Sept. 27, a goodly number of the parishioners of St. Joseph's Church, Morell waited on their loving pastor at the parochial residence and presented him with an address and a well filled purse amounting to the sum of two hundred and forty dollars (\$240.)

Rev. Dear Father:—The parishioners of St. Joseph's having learned that in obedience to the ordinary of the Diocese you are about to sever your connection with this congregation and remove to another field of sacerdotal labor cannot allow you to go without expressing their appreciation of your many noble qualities of head and heart and their regret at your departure.

During the few years of your pastorate of St. Joseph's your unselfish devotion to duty, your kind attention to the sick and your quite unassuming manner have endeared you in our hearts and it is also consoling to find that you are to remain so near to us that we can expect to again often meet you. We congratulate the people of our parish on their good fortune and pray that you may be long spared to continue your blessed work and would ask you to some time remember us at the Holy Altar.

In conclusion we ask you to accept this purse as a tangible evidence how our best wishes for your welfare and the hope that health and happiness may be yours in whatever portion of the Lord's vineyard you may be called to exercise the Sacred ministry.
