Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, who has been a resident of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

DON'T PEEL POTATOES. FOOD EXPERTS ADVICE

Probably no foodstuff loses so much in the hands of the cook as the potato. The vegetable is peeled and hacked until the part that appears on the table is but a small proportion of the whole as it weighed in the kitchen.

"Don't peel your potatoes; cook them in their skins," is the advice of a food expert. Paring and boiling potatoes is most wasteful because:

(1) Not only the skin, but the surface layer and perhaps 10 per cent. of the flesh are removed by thick paring, and the total loss may amount to as much as one-fifth of the whole root, or 1 lb. in every 5 lb.

(2) The surface layers which are wasted contain a larger percentage of solids than the remainder.

(3) The subsequent boiling dissolves out soluble ingredients of the potato, and also breaks down the surface into the water, which is thrown away.

Potatoes peeled and put into cold water and boiled have been shown by experiment to lose:

Flesh-forming substances, 15.8 p. c. Ash or mineral matter, 18.8 p. c. Carbohydrates or starch, 3 p. c.

Boiled or steamed in their jackets they lose only:

Flesh-forming substances, 1 p. c. Ash or mineral matter, 2 p. c. Starch, practically none.

Steaming is preferable to boiling, and the advantage of this method over that adopted by the "plain cook" is not only that a great economy is effected, but that all the flavor of the vegetable is retained. In steaming potatoes in their jackets a cut should be made in the skin at each end, to allow the steam to escape and prevent them becoming stogy.

"Nothing can be done to safeguard the supply now," said a well known dealer, "but to cook the potatoes in their skins."

"It is a capital idea," said Mrs. Eustace Miles, "I should like to tell everyone, 'Don't waste a potato peel.' For years we have served potatoes in their skins, and every day the number of people who ask for them so increases. Cooked in a double pan with hot oil, and not baked, the skin itself can be eaten with perfect enjoyment. Indeed, you don't really know you are eating a potato until you eat the skin. Not only do you get greater nutriment in this way but you eliminate all waste and your potatoes go very much further."

COSSACKS THE BACKBONE OF RUSSIA.

It is significant that the Cossacks of Russia have taken sides with the new democratic Government and have announced that they will fight against the Germans," remarked Mr. H. A. Herbst, an American who has travelled in Russia extensively, to a Washington Post reporter. "For centuries the Cossacks have been loyal to Russia, not to any particular king or dynasty, and they have always landed on the winning side. The Cossacks fought for the Emperor of Germany against the Germans," remarked Mr. Herbst, "and for Turkey against Moscow, and they had no scruples in siding with Mes-cow and Crimea against the Poles."

"The Cossacks constitute the most loyal body of soldiers in Russia. In the last revolution in Russia the Cossacks sent an ultimatum to the rebels that if they did not discontinue their agitation against the Cossacks would march against them 500,000 strong and annihilate them. This declaration had its effect, and while some few soldiers remained, no Cossacks are the standing behind the Government and the Entente allies, there can be no question, in my opinion, of the future of Russia or the continuance of Russia in the war until Germany is beaten."
