Speaking of Prince Edward Island's crop, the Maritime Merchant says:—Prince Edward Island has a population of about 100,000, and makes a good showing in the matter of production. The total value of the field crops of the Island in 1910 amounted to nearly \$10,000,000. Hay leads in point of value, but the oats amounted to \$2,250,000 and wheat amounting to \$550,000 was also raised. Three million bushels of potatoes were produced on the Island with a value of \$1,200,000.

A despatch from Boston dated June 6th says:—Miss Ruby Sargent of Brookline and Edward A. Gillen of Charlottetown, P. E. I., were married yesterday afternoon by the Rev. Dr. Cortland Myers at Tremont Temple. The bride had no attendants, and only the immediate family and relatives were present at the ceremony. The bride wore a white serge suit trimmed with white satin and wore a large picture hat. Mr. and Mrs. Gillen left for their summer home at Onset Bay where they will stay during the summer months.

Farmers in this Province will be interested in the following contribution from the Department of Agriculture:—The University of Minnesota has just completed a systematic investigation of what farm products cost upon the farms as managed by the owners. Three routes were laid out on each of which 15 farmers agreed to co-operate in the investigation. A student of the university was sent out every day of the year to gather in detail all the facts needed for the keeping of a set of business books and the writing of an annual balance sheet. All the fields were accurately surveyed and an inventory taken of stock, machinery and tools. Every hour of work whether done by the hired help, by the farmer himself or a member of the family, was charged up at the rate paid in the district for the kind of work done. Some of the facts learned are not a little surprising. During one winter month the farmers of one county averaged 5 3/5 hours of labor per day. In another 6 4/5 hours. In the planting months the average hours of labor for a man was 9 4/5 hours, and for a working horse 6 1/2 hours. Many more equally surprising facts were brought out.

Heath Haviland and Miss Haviland, Halifax, at whose home she passed away. She had been in failing health for some time and a persistent attack of pneumonia so weakened her heart that death was imminent for some time before it eventually came. The body will arrive in this city tonight from Halifax, accompanied by Miss Haviland, sister of the deceased, and will be taken to E. H. 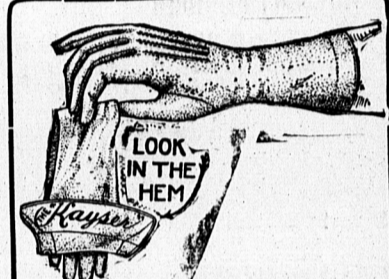
