THE CHARLOTTETOWN HOTEL CO., LTD.
Among the bills passed at the session of the Legislature just closed was one incorporating the Charlottetown Hotel Company, Ltd. The first or provisional directors of this company are Messrs. R. H. Starns, Bruce Stewart, F. R. Hearst, Charles Lyons, J. A. Farquharson, D. O'M. Reddin and George J. Rogers, who remain in office until others are elected.
The capital stock of the company is to be \$175,000, divided into 1,750 shares of \$100 each.
The affairs of the company are to be

managed by a Board of Directors of not less than three and not exceeding seven, the same to be fixed by the by-laws of the company who shall be elected at the general annual meeting.
Under the act of incorporation power is given to the City Council to exempt the company from taxation for twenty years in its property in excess of \$40,000.
