Deaths Attributed To Cold Spell — North Sea Shipping Paralyzed.

By PAT USHIE Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Dec. 19.—(CP Cable)—Snow mantled many parts of the United Kingdom in a seasonable white blanket tonight as an influx of frigid air continued from far-off Siberia.

Key roads and frozen radiators hampered motorists while frost delayed rail services and storms tied frozen pipes prevented firemen from saving the homes.

During the storm in the North Sea, George Thomson, deckhand on the trawler Marlborough, was trapped in his bunk by five feet of snow.

Thirty workmen on a Warwickshire airplane factory quit their jobs, claiming the office was too cold.

Sports stores filled their windows with winter gear.

Rendered Homeless Fifteen destroyed four cottages and left 13 persons homeless in the village of Mordach Bishop, in Devon.

PAIR APPEAR ON CHARGES OF CONSPIRACY

HALIFAX, Dec. 19.—(CP)—More than 26 exhibits were produced in court before County Magistrate B. W. Russell today as William Babbin, Moncton, N. B., storekeeper and Thomas P. Slattery of east Saint John appeared for preliminary hearing on charges of conspiracy to defraud the Dominion Government.

The exhibits included several memoranda listing expenditures for "landings" and payments to an individual described as "Baldy."

Royal Canadian Mounted Police from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick told of their findings in a house allegedly occupied by Slattery in east Saint John.

A Motor vessel, the Amuck, was also mentioned in an exhibit. In one, Captain Thomas McGrady was authorized to take full charge of the vessel.

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CREW OF NOVA SCOTIA SCHOONER RESCUED OFF SABLE ISLAND

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(CP)—The New York-bound United States Lined American Farmer halted tonight to rescue the weary crew of the three-masted fishing schooner Fieldwood, waterlogged and deck awash in the treacherous seas 100 miles southeast of Sable Island.

Captain H. A. Pederson, reporting the rescue of the crew "after much suffering," added two names to the role of heroes of these seas with his brief message: "Special commendation to Chief Officer (Charles K.) Guise and (James T.) Knowlton (second officer) and boat's crew for excellent work during dark night."

The Fieldwood, a 328-ton boat out of Windsor, N. S., sailed Dec. 2 from Gaspe for Barbados. The schooner carried a crew of seven men.

UNITED STATES DEFIES TOKYO EXTENDS CREDITS TO CHINA DESPITE WARNING.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The United States Treasury, ignoring strong words of protest from Japan, extended its credits today to China.

While the Japanese Foreign Minister Arita, was terming "dangerous" a \$25,000,000 loan given to China last week by the Export-Import Bank, Treasury Secretary Morgenthau was renewing for indefinite period an agreement to lend China undisclosed amounts of dollar exchange.

With a bland "who's at war?" Morgenthau asserted that no question of neutrality was involved in the credits to China.

PROTEST NEW FEDERAL REGULATIONS STORAGE "INCONVENIENT," PORT RATES "TOO HIGH" CLAIM N. B. POTATO GROWERS.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 19.—(CP)—New Brunswick potato growers at a meeting here last night criticized new federal regulations governing storage and shipment of potatoes as "inconvenient" and port rates as "too high."

H. H. Hatfield, Hatfield shipper, warned that shippers would look to other ports unless high terminal charges and the regulations here are altered.

H. L. Mulhern, Grand Falls, here to supervise loading of the S. S. Nordraer, due to sail tonight with 20,000 cases of seed potatoes, said several carloads of his potatoes had slipped from the train in Carleton Place, Ont., where they were to be shipped to the U.S.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—(CP)—There has been no change in storage or top wharfage rates in New Brunswick ports, National Harbors Board officials said today in reply to complaints of New Brunswick potato growers at a meeting in Saint John last night that "new federal regulations" were inconvenient and rates too high.

PREMIER MAKES APPEAL DURING DEBATE IN HOUSE

Warns Germany Against Mistaking Britain's Love Of Peace And Willingness To Compromise For General Weakness.

Cable)—A fighting speech by Prime Minister Chamberlain in which he outlined Great Britain's foreign policy in firm and unmistakable words, led tonight to resounding defeat for the Labor Party's censure motion in the House of Commons.

By a vote of 340 to 143, the House turned down the Labor motion censuring the Government's foreign policy. The division came after Mr. Chamberlain said German leaders would be making a "tragic blunder" if they mistook British love of peace and willingness to compromise for general weakness.

The Prime Minister's speech was regarded as the most outspoken he has made since the Munich conference of September, particularly in its sections relating to Germany.

It was interpreted this way:—The Prime Minister is still wedded to his appeasement policy but is becoming weary of making all the concessions, giving all the outward appearance of desiring a lasting and amicable peace.

Desire Cooperation The Prime Minister emphasized Great Britain had no desire to hamper or cramp Germany. There would be no vindictiveness in this country. On the contrary, there was a firm conviction that the best way to improve the general lot, there would be neither peace or progress in Europe in the things which make life worth living.

At the same time, it is not enough for us to express that desire. It takes two to make war, and I am still waiting for a sign from those who speak for most of the people that they are prepared to make their contribution to peace which would help us as much as it would help them.

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HEPBURN FEUD IS SIDESTEPED BY LIBERAL CAUCUS

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—(CP)—A complete survey of the situation of the Liberal Party in all Ontario constituencies by a committee of the Liberal Caucus under the chairmanship of Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, resulted from today's caucus of the Federal Liberal members of the House of Commons, senators and candidates defeated in the 1936 general election.

While voting complete confidence in the leadership of Prime Minister Mackenzie King, the caucus refrained from any express condemnation of Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario, whose attacks on Mr. Mackenzie King were the reason for the meeting.

Although these attacks were considered disturbing and to be regretted, members of the caucus reported there was no split in the Liberal Party throughout the province.

AMERICAN-TURKISH TRADE PACT DRAFTED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The United States carried its trade expansion program into Turkey today in a move which is expected to have a reciprocal trade agreement with Australia.

The State Department announced that a new trade pact just initiated with Turkey is based upon the principles of unconditional non-discrimination treatment and free foreign exchange, the two American trade weapons in direct contrast with Germany's barrier and blocked exchange policies.

The new American-Turkish agreement probably will be signed formally in January, the State Department said.

HUNGARY PLANS NEW SERIES OF ANTI-SEMITIC MEASURES

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BUDAPEST, Dec. 19.—Hungary drafted a new anti-Semitic legislation today while Rumania is preparing a colonization plan in two walled-off areas in southeastern Europe.

The proposed Hungarian laws, to be introduced in Parliament Friday will tighten up measures which now limit the participation of Jews in business and professions to 20 per cent of the total engaged in any calling.

In Bucharest, the Rumanian Foreign Office disclosed that a plan to assist Jews to settle in Palestine and various British possessions was the subject of diplomatic discussions.

The immediate objective was to develop a colonization scheme for 150,000 Rumanian Jews now in the eastern provinces of Bucovina, Bessarabia and Transylvania. Ultimately the project would be extended to a greater number of Rumania's 1,075,000 Jews, it was indicated.

(In London, a British official said the Rumanian Government had made "certain vague inquiries" about placing Rumanian Jews in British colonies but that no definite proposals had been put forward.)
