Poles shall be of Spruce or Fir, straight and sound. Lumber except where specified, shall be spruce or hemlock, all square edged and sawn to the exact size specified, perfectly sound and free from wane and shakes.

Material for Lot No. 29, shall be delivered on or before the 1st day of April, 1933. Material for Lots Nos. 1 to 14 and for lots Nos. 23 to 28 and for Lot No. 30 shall be delivered on or before the 15th day of April 1933. Material for lots Nos. 15 to 22 to be delivered on or before the 15th day of May 1933.

Parties tendering shall submit a price per cord for poles, a price each for piles and posts, a price per M.B.M. for sawn lumber and a price per cubic yard for field stone. All material shall be carefully inspected before delivery is taken by the Department or payment made.
