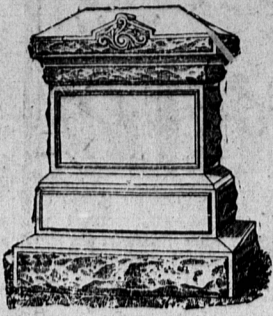

Macdonald, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County, yesterday the assault case which arose at a West River School Meeting recently was settled by the defendant paying the costs incurred. Another assault case, that of McKenzie vs Angus, both of Southport, was further adjourned for one week.

The entrance examinations for Prince of Wales College are being held at the five stations in this province, viz: Charlottetown, Montague, Souris, Alberton and Summerside. Yesterday afternoon M. Ross Bethune, G. Linus Smith, and R. H. McLaughlin, City, left for Montague; Hugh Warburton, City; for Souris; G. J. McCormick, City; for Summerside, and Lea N. Seaman, City; for Alberton; where they will conduct the examinations.

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening at 7.30. There were present Judge Blanchard, Messrs James Nasir, and J. J. Johnston. The Teachers' reports for the last month showed the enrolment to be 1094—the actual attendance 961—the average 871.52, the per centage 91.02—number of cases of tardiness 148—number of truants 10—visits 78—notice 38—corporal punishment 9—the highest per centage male was 98. Four teachers had not one tardy pupil while three teachers had only one case. Miss Maud McAnnell, who taught the Primary Department in West Kent St., School for over four years resigned. Owing to the fact that only four of the members of the Board were present no appointments were made to fill two vacancies in the staff of teachers. The question of opening an ungraded department asked for by the Children's Aid was also deferred till next meeting of the Board. Clarkin Bros were awarded the tender for the coal supply—their tender being the lowest—and Mr. Howatt's tender for kalsomining was accepted subject to certain conditions. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.
