Potato Bug Pet is Costly

LONDON, June 21.—(CP)—The wrath of his Britannic majesty, plus Scotland Yard, metropolitan police and presumably all "Beef Eaters" was invoked today under the potent "Destruction of Pests and Insects Act" against a modest half-inch beetle carried in a match-box in a citizen's pocket.

England was stirred almost as much by the beetles as by the bomb letters which Cabinet members have been receiving from continental foes. Beetles are the chief threat to the security of Britain's potato fields—and Britain without potatoes would be like a blonde without a hair-do—and the most innocent of bugs have been roughly garnered from hundreds of suburban gardens and hustled to the nearest police station.

But Albert Francis Burwood 31, of Clapham, appeared in court under no less a charge than that

of keeping "a live Colorado in captivity, contrary to article 2 of the Colorado Beetle Order, 1933." The beetle was in a matchbox in his pocket when Burwood returned from Belgium and when an inquisitive Customs officer at Dover asked him if he knew how dangerous the beetle was, Burwood replied that he was aware of the publicity given the insect and that he had brought it over as a souvenir for his friends. The officer stuck a pin through the "monster" and turned it over to the Agriculture Minister,

Highlight of the morning session was the devotional address by Rev. G. A. Corbett, speaking from Isaiah 6:1-4 on "A Vision of God". Mr. Corbett stated that Isaiah's vision was intensely practical. He was to be a preacher to all people, and the vision revealed the fact that God endures, that He manifests Himself to man, that He is everywhere, and must be held in reverence. God is holy, and only he who is pure in heart God's face shall see. Rev. J. D. Davison closed the session with prayer.

3:30 P.M. FRIDAY

Rev. G. A. Corbett gave the second of the devotional addresses on the subject "A Vision of Self." This is next in importance to the vision of God. When we think of God we also think of ourselves. If our vision of God is slight, it will have but a temporary influence upon our life. Isaiah said: "Woe is me, for I am undone, I am a man of unclean lips." He shared in the sinfulness of man. Over against God's righteousness, man is unrighteous. If man confesses his sin, God is faithful and just to forgive him. In the light of a vision of God, we may well pray "Lord, make me pure."
In giving the social service report, Rev. E. J. Barrass stated that the field of social service is a large one. He gave statistics to show that the liquor situation is growing progressively worse in P. E. I., and suggested that contracting purchasing power might curtail sale.

On the Christian social council are representatives from all the religious bodies of the Island. The Government has under consideration the appointment of a social worker, Mother's Allowance Act, and workmen's compensation. Also it is hoped that an institution for juvenile delinquents will be established on P. E. I.

Rev. E. J. Barrass also gave a report on Home Missions, in which he stated that since 1879, we have been conducting Home Mission work. Many church leaders have come from Home Mission and rural fields. There are at present 222 Home Mission churches in the Maritime Provinces, with 7407 members and 218 Sunday Schools. Many baptisms take place in rural areas. Mr. Barrass urged a loyal support of Home Mission work for the future. The report of the Association Clerk showed progress in all branches of the work, both numerically and financially.
Dr. A. Gibson, Wolfville, N. S., closed the session with prayer.

FRIDAY EVENING

The evening session opened with a song service led by Rev. C. O. Howlett.

B. Y. P. U. REPORT

The devotional period was conducted by the Charlottetown B. Y. P. U., with Jack Proude presiding. The opening hymn was "Come Let Us Sing of a Wonderful Love." Scripture was taken from Psalm 139. "A solo, "Beside Still Waters", was rendered by Sterling Inman. A poem, "The Presence" was read by Shirley Crosby, who afterwards led in prayer. The hymn, "O Jesus I Have Promised" was sung. The beautiful story of how Nicholas Herman, later known as Brother Lawrence, came to know God, was read by Marian MacEachern. The devotional closed by singing hymn "Nearer Still Nearer."

After a few words of introduction by Rev. E. J. Barrass, the president, Miss Betty Magee, conducted the business period. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The report of the nominating committee was given by Rev. Barrass and was adopted as follows:

The retiring president extended a welcome to the new president, and spoke a word of appreciation to the B. Y. P. U. for the cooperation given her. The new president expressed her hope that the Young Peoples work would carry on with increased enthusiasm throughout the coming year. An address on Acadia was given by President (Dr.) F. W. Patterson, Wolfville, N. S., who stated that there have been many changes in everything through the years. Through our knowledge of the world we are living in a new world, but we as individuals have changed but little. There is a difference between the purpose of a thing and the use to which it is put. The only possible defence known against atomic destruction is the heart of a people filled with righteousness. Education must go on to give men the mastery of the physical world, but it is necessary that, while gaining the mastery of the physical, men themselves become mastered by another.

Referring to Acadia University, Dr. Patterson said that, through loyal support of friends, it has been possible to acquire new buildings, to beautify the campus, and enlarge the equipment. Problems are the obtaining of the right kind of staff, preserving a cultural weight in what is a practical society, and providing accommodation for students.

Dr. Patterson concluded by saying that there can be no hope for peace until churches, universities, and the press combine to build a Christian civilization based on lives that must be changed.

SATURDAY 10 A.M.

The session opened with a devotional period conducted by Rev. G. A. Corbett, whose subject was "A Vision of Duty".

He said Isaiah heard the call of God to a great task, one which he could perform by God's help. The call of God may be heard in human need and suffering, and those who give themselves in the service of God in ministry to others find fullness of joy.

Rev. J. D. Davison led a discussion on church finance, in which many took part.

Dr. A. Gibson reported on Western Missions, Grand Ligne Mission, and the Baptist Federation of Canada, giving a concise resume of the work, and presenting a challenge for the future.

SATURDAY P.M. and EVENING

The afternoon session was under the auspices of the W. M. S., the guest speaker being Mrs. Warren Eaton, who described her recent trip to India.

The speaker on Saturday evening was Dr. A. Gibson, whose subject was Christian Education. He stated that about 80% of boys and girls are not attending Sunday Schools anywhere. These boys and girls are to be future leaders. What kind of leaders are they to be? The goal of Sunday School work should be: "unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." The teaching should lead to a knowledge of God as Jesus revealed Him, to an acceptance of Jesus as savior and friend, and the building of Christian character and membership in the Christian Church.

Our work is not done until we have all come to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, was Dr. Gibson's closing challenge.

SUNDAY MORNING

The speaker at the morning service of worship in the Summerside Baptist Church, in connection with the P. E. I. Baptist Association, was Rev. H. B. Crawford, of Montague, whose theme was "Heart Knowledge."

Referring to knowledge, Mr. Crawford classified it as secular and spiritual, and said that spiritual knowledge was the greatest of all.

Paul counted all things but loss for Christ and a knowledge of Him.

He desired three things:
1. To know Christ.
2. To know the power of His Resurrection.
3. To know the fellowship of His suffering.

All this knowledge must be of the heart. We come to know Christ through intimate contact with Him as Savior.

We may believe that Christ died and that through his death we have salvation, but what we need to live the Christian life

her experiences during her recent tour of our Baptist Mission Stations in India, and of her fellowship in the Associations there. Concluding, Mrs. Eaton said we have a great opportunity to give Christianity to India, and it is only Christianity that can unify India and the world.

A solo, "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" was effectively rendered by Mr. J. B. Lewis, Free-town.

The Moderator, Rev. E. J. Barrass presided, and at the evening service welcomed the incoming Moderator, Rev. C. A. Hicks, to office.

The speaker at the evening session was Rev. J. D. Davison, Charlottetown, who took as his

text, Matthew 13:38—"The field is the World."

This is the theme of all world-minded organizations—industrial and political, the speaker said. It has been the theme of the Christian religion from its beginning, has carried Christianity to this land, and has inspired the great modern missionary movement.

Immigrants bring ideas. It is our Christian task to emigrate the idea—of Christ and His offer and assurance of salvation.

All our work depends on thinking of 'his as One World to be evangelized. The Baptist Church at home will prosper materially and spiritually only as it is moved by this one great thought.
