SPAIN IN CUBA.

When by the peace protocol Spain agreed to evacuate Cuba and terminate her sovereignty in the island it was not made quite clear just what property might be removed. The first questionable act was the removal of the remains of Columbus, to which there was some demur in the American newspapers, but no official notice of the act was taken by the Washington government. More recently it has come to the knowledge of the American administration that the Spaniards are removing the cannon from the Cuban fortifications and have, in fact, already taken many of them away. This has now been peremptorily forbidden by message of President McKinley to Premier Sagasta, through the French minister at Washington. The notice is coupled with the intimation that if any further removal of cannon from the fortifications is attempted, American war vessels will be sent to put a stop to the proceeding. This intimation will doubtless be respected.

As in the case of the transfer of farm property from one proprietor to another the vendor must take care not to remove fixtures, so it is held that Spain must permit the cannon in the fortified towns to remain as fixtures, to be transferred with the territory of the island to the new possessors, whether these are to be the Cuban people or the United States. The incident serves to show that there are many questions of a difficult and intricate nature yet to be settled between Spain and her conqueror. But there is always a short and easy way of coming at a settlement when one of the two parties can effect its purpose by a simple demand, backed by force.

Cable despatches tell that the British cabinet has decided to proclaim a protectorate over Egypt. This will make a new complication hard to be understood. The Sultan of Turkey is the sovereign of Egypt, and receives an annual tribute from the Khedive. From 1879 for two years Britain and France exercised a joint control over the finances of Egypt, but this was terminated when France refused to join in the suppression of Arabi's revolt in 1881-82. Since the latter year Britain has had an army in occupation of Egypt and full control of the finances. Jointly with the Egyptian forces a British army has now reconquered the Sudan. A protectorate can only mean some further advance in British control and toward ultimate possession.

It was most natural that General Kitchener should have been accorded a triumphal reception on his arrival in London. His victorious progress up the Nile to Khartoum and Fashoda has commanded the admiration, not only of his own countrymen but of the entire civilized world. His arrival in the metropolis seems to have been the occasion for a great and well-deserved popular ovation.

FAMOUS SOUVENIRS.

Relics of Napoleon, Prince Charlie, and Washington.

An interesting relic is the cradle in which the Emperor Napoleon Bonaparte slumbered in his infancy. It is put to a pleasing use by its present owner, Mrs. Van Rensselaer Cruger. Standing in a corner of her drawing-room, it is heaped full of flowers at most times of the year. Mrs. Cruger picked up the cradle in Paris at an auction. It is of dark wood and without any particular ornamentation.

America possesses another relic of Napoleon Bonaparte—the sleigh in which he escaped from Russia in 1812. It belongs to a Chicago woman and has been in her family for fifty years or more. A parchment—certificated, dated April 7, 1816, and signed by a Bonaparte of Silesia—testifies that this is the sleigh in which the Emperor of the French made his escape from Russia. The harness is a wonderful piece of workmanship.

Queen Victoria treasures among her relics Prince Charlie's walking stick, the one which was mislaid by him on the morning of Culloden and afterward found in his bed-room. The handle of the stick has carved upon it two heads, one representing wisdom and the other folly. The Queen got it at auction for £160.

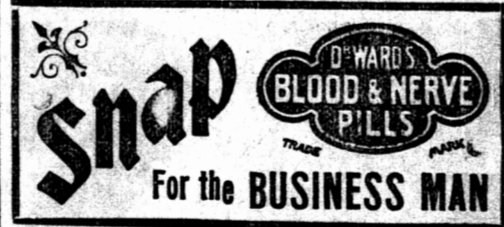
The Empress Josephine's piano is in a London showroom. It was made in 1808 by order of Napoleon and presented to the Empress. It was stolen during the sacking of the Tuileries and afterward sold at public auction. The case is one of the finest rosewood, ornamented with ormolu, while the keys are made of mother-of-pearl and tortoise shell. Napoleon's taste is shown by the fact that one of the five pedals works a drum and triangle attachment. The wedding dress of the unfortunate Queen Marie Antoinette has been discovered in the ancient church of Kenauweg, near Vienna. It has for many generations been the custom of Austrian brides to present their wedding dresses to a church for the adornment of an image of the Holy Virgin or to be made into vestments.

The mirror before which General Washington made his early toilet has for the last thirty-five years been hanging in a house in Warrenton, Va. It was purchased at the sale of the personal effects of Lawrence Washington, a great nephew of the first President. The glass is framed in gilt, and at the top, in a backing of white and black enamel, is Washington's coat of arms engraved in gold, with his motto, *Exitus acta probat*.

Another Washington relic is a sago palm belonging to the White House. The present head gardener has looked up its history, and verifies the fact that it was presented to General Washington by a Baltimore merchant, who got it in Cuba when it had already obtained a respectable age. The plant was for a long time at Mount Vernon, but one day Washington presented it to a fair visitor who admired it. The plant was an heirloom until about fifty years ago, when with other things it was sold at auction and secured by the head gardener of the White House. It was thought to be 200 years old—older than the government.—New York Sun.

SPAIN'S GENERALS.

Spain possesses, according to the Official Register, 5 Captain Generals, 12 Lieutenant Generals, 75 Generals of Division, 179 Brigade Generals, and 45 staff officers with the rank of General on the active list, with 211 more on the reserve list, making 557 general officers for the army. The navy contains an Admiral, 6 Vice Admirals, 15 Rear Admirals, and 47 other officers of equal rank to a General on the active list, while the reserve list has 63 such officers. Army and navy combined have 699 names of general officers on the payrolls.

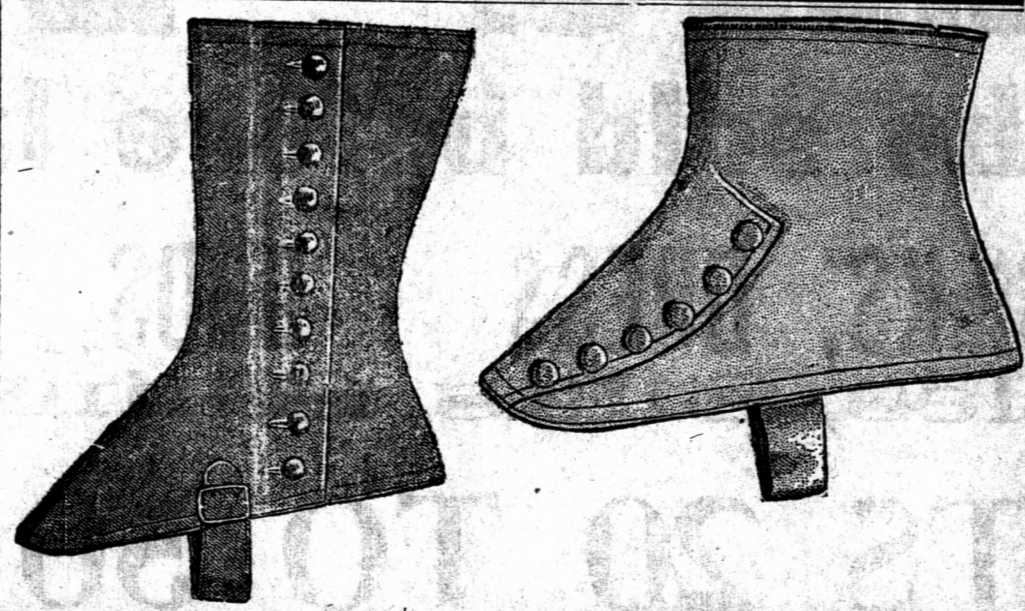
