FEARS HUN SUBS. WILL POUNCE ON U.S. PORTS

PHILADELPHIA, March 27--German submarines may already be lurking off the Atlantic to dash into such harbors as New York, Philadelphia and Boston the moment war is declared, to destroy commerce, and also release aeroplanes to bombard the cities. Lieut. Commander F. R. Payne, U. S. N. (retired), declared today when he addressed a meeting called by the Philadelphia Naval League Relief, of which Mrs. Estotestburg is chairman.

"What is more likely?" he asked. "They could slip up the Delaware at night, make a surprise attack on Philadelphia and retire to sea before pursuit could be organized."

Lieut. Commander Payne described in detail how the German submarines could gather about our coast and receive communications from home by wireless, "and we can do the same thing," he said. The speaker said an effective anti-submarine patrol of the coast would cost \$10,000 a day.

CUBAN REBELS CONFIDENT

To Determine Whether Conflict Will Be Continued.

SANTIAGO, Cuba, March 27--Whether the rebellion will be continued appears to depend on the outcome of conferences which are being held at Guantanamo between rebel leaders and American naval officers. Tomorrow is the last day of the truce agreed to by Major Fernandez, the rebel commander, but the American officers are confident that Colonel Jane, representing the Cuban government, will be able to effect some understanding before the expiration of this period.

The truce has been only partially effective, probably on account of the inability of the rebel leaders to communicate with hands in districts difficult of access. There has been skirmishing near the outskirts of Santiago, but the smoke from burning canefields is less evident.

ROOSEVELT'S OFFER HAS BEEN REFUSED

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, March 28--The New York Sun says:

"Rumors have reached here that Roosevelt's offer to Wilson of a fully manned and armed division has been rejected. From what can be learned of the division it has at present between 60,000 and 75,000 men enrolled, all pledged to follow the leadership of Roosevelt.

Regimental colonels have been named and the outfit has been almost completely officered. It is asserted by those who have knowledge of the enterprise that the entire force could be mobilized within four days. Because of rumors of rejection, the division officers may send a delegation to the colonel in Florida to learn his new plans."

MORE PEACE SUGGESTIONS PROBABLE.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 28--A despatch to the Morning Post from Amsterdam says:

"In Berlin political circles great importance is attached to a visit of the Austrian Foreign Minister to the German capital which coincides with the visit of Enver Pasha, the Turkish Minister for War, who arrived Sunday evening. It is persistently rumored in some circles that these visits are associated with new peace suggestions."

REDUCTION IN PRICE OF COAL

(Special to The Guardian.)

NEW YORK, March 28--The Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Co. today announced a reduction of fifty cents a ton in the price of coal, to become effective April 2. The reduction applies to stove, egg and nut sizes. According to custom ten cents a ton will be added to the price of these sizes each month until September 1st. Coal dealers say they believe all producing companies will follow the lead of the Philadelphia and Reading notwithstanding earlier predictions that on account of unusual conditions this spring the customary reduction should not be made.

BAD EXPLOSION IN BAPAUME

(Special to The Guardian.)

PARIS, March 28--An accidental explosion occurred yesterday in the City Hall at Bapaume and a number of persons were buried in the debris. Raoul Briquet and Albert Tallander, deputies from Arrondissement of Arras, who have been engaged in relief work are reported among victims.

NEW YORK, March 28--The southern wing of the retreating German army is slowly receding along a ten mile front under the furious onslaughts of the French. The first section of Coucy-St. Gobain forests has been completely cleared of the invaders.

General Nivelle's troops are now face to face with the last formidable natural barrier which lies between them and the Laon plateau of St. Gobain. This densely wooded plateau lies between the Oise and Ailette and about ten thousand acres in extent, rising from about eighty to a hundred feet in height. No railways or highroads traverse it but an important railroad sweeps around the southern border and runs north to Clusesy. This road is in French hands up to within about three miles of Anizy, ten miles west of Laon.

To the north the French are about two miles from St. Gobain, the centre of the most famous glass factories in Europe. St. Gobain is 15 miles northwest of Laon. No change has taken place in the neighborhood of St. Quentin where the Germans are still making desperate efforts to wrest from the French the Besigny Benay Plateau, undisputed possession of which will, according to military critics, render the fall of the city inevitable.

Further north the British have made some slight progress but no material change in the situation has taken place. Bad weather is reported to be seriously interfering with operations on this portion of the front. Sporadic fighting occurred in several of the other war theatres but nothing to indicate the commencement of major operations.

FRENCH CAPTURE IMPORTANT POSITIONS.

(Special to The Guardian.)

PARIS, March 28--Advance of the French in the region north of Soissons continued during the night. Progress was made north of Ailette River and east of the Le Uilly-Neuville-Margival line, where important positions were captured. These gains are recorded in today's official report which also indicated unusual activity further east. Artillery of both French and Germans kept up a violent fire yesterday and during the night on the front between Butte du Mesnil and Maisons de Champagne. Heavy artillery fighting is in progress in the region east of the lower forest of Coucy.

IN MEXICO

EL PASTO, Texas, March 28--Germans are making the Tampico oil fields from the border, according to information received here by United States government agents. It is feared an effort will be made to destroy the oil wells in that district, the report stated. The Tampico oil fields are controlled by Lord Cowdray of England.

THE MOEWE HAD MANY PRISONERS ON BOARD

BERLIN, via Sayville, March 28--An additional list of vessels captured by the German auxiliary cruiser Moeve, which recently returned to Germany from a second cruise in the Atlantic, was issued by the admiralty today, including the Canadian (Newfoundland) sailing vessel Jean, of 215 tons gross, and the Duchess of Cornwall, a British three-masted schooner, owned in St. John's Nfld., which was last reported sailing from St. John's on December 4 for Gibraltar. The auxiliary cruiser Moeve had on board 583 prisoners when she reached her home port.

HOSPITAL SHIP SURVIVORS LANDED

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, March 28--Survivors of the British hospital ship Australians were landed at a village on the shore of an unnamed estuary. The villagers were aroused early in the morning by the noise of motor boats and other crafts and hastened to their assistance. As many as possible of the survivors were supplied with clothes and wraps, but the village wardrobes were soon exhausted and quilts and blankets were called into service. The refugees said that the torpedo which sank the hospital ship struck near the stern and almost missed.
