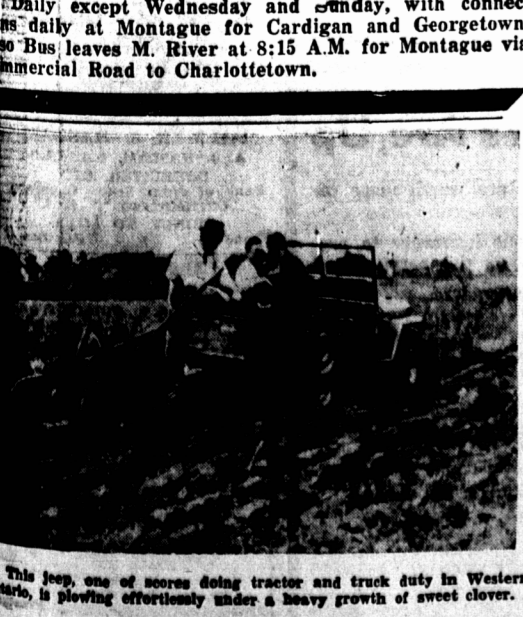

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching Sunday morning the Minister, the Rev. T. H. E. Somers, said: Back in our Bible is the story of Hagar who had left Egypt for Syria, and there prospered. He had married an Egyptian princess and a son was born to them. Here he lived for many years, and never confessed his son's sickness. But at the last he sought the Egyptian Pharaoh. "Let me depart, that I may go to mine own country." In surprise Pharaoh asked him, "But what hast thou lacked even the riches of the world? Hagar gratefully 'howbeit let me go.' Therein is a parable of all who are seeking God. The walls of space and time were pushed back to make a wilderness even before the forces of industry and nationalism swept man away from home and soil, the human heart was stricken with a discontent. It is stricken now—and worse, because the world seems vast and cold, and because modern science is cruel. It is stricken, for it is our human lot to live in the temporal while longing for the eternal. 'Lord, Thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations.' Our profoundest need is the recovery of the sure sense of God's reality. Wherever the infinites of space, and rejoice in them, if they are filled with God, and if God is really our God. We can endure the abyss of time if it is held in God, and if we see held in God as in a mother's arms. We can endure even the rough and buffed of our age and the poverty which for most men is sure to come, if we are sure of God. Who is both Friend and Father. We begin to understand the history of our era. In the Renaissance man succumbed to a subtle worship of his own mind. In the Industrial Revolution he was beguiled into worshipping his own skill. In the pre-war exploitation of the planet he descended still lower, and worshipped his own money. Wherever man worships himself he degrades himself, and becomes a stranger to his brother. The at-homeness of our forefathers was not as we have guessed, that their world was small but that their God was real. Our need is to keep our God in our contract then—and would not if we could. We have glimpsed in our lives, it is not ungodlike. In any event, what we need is the surety, or a better surety, in our hearts. The Word of God is the Word of Infinite Mystery become Personal God. What we need is new faith in the 'miraculous' Gospel of the Incarnation: 'The Word became flesh and dwelt among us.'
