**England To Seek Approval of Iraq Treaty by League**

(United Press)  
GENEVA, July 31.—When the Council of the League of Nations meets in August, just before the assembly which opens September 1, it will be asked by Great Britain to approve a draft instrument setting forth the conditions under which England is expected to carry out the mandate over Iraq, of Mesopotamia. Instead of the customary mandate arrangement which applies to the Pacific Ocean Islands and other mandated lands, like Syria and Palestine, Great Britain has inserted her mandate obligations in a bilateral treaty which the Bagdad parliament recently ratified.  
The council will be requested to agree that the mandate shall be implemented by a treaty of alliance between Great Britain and Iraq, and to approve an arrangement by which the treaty of alliance shall terminate when Iraq becomes a member of the League of Nations. In any case the treaty of alliance comes to an end not later than four years from the coming into force of the Treaty of Lausanne. The consent of the council is required for any modification of the terms of the alliance, and England promises that if any dispute should arise between England and any other member of the League of Nations, the interpretation of the alliance shall be submitted to the world court of justice, if it cannot be settled by direct negotiation.  
The military agreement which forms an annex to the main treaty provides that Iraq accepts full responsibility for the maintenance of internal order and for the defence of Iraq from external aggression. With this end in view, it is agreed that the material support now being rendered by Great Britain shall be progressively reduced with all possible expedition. Future British assistance will take the form of stationing adequate British forces in Iraq, officers in England, and the furnishing of arms, ammunition and aeroplanes for the Iraq army.  
Article six of the main treaty stipulates that the King of England undertakes to use his good offices to secure the admission of Iraq into the League of Nations as soon as possible.

Just as the remains were being carried to the cemetery the remains of Mrs. J. J. McLeod Charlottetown were brought to the church. After the service of Mr. Keefe was closed at the grave the people went back to the church where a service for Mrs. McLeod was held and later the remains were laid to rest in the Hartsville cemetery.  
The three services were conducted the pastor Rev. R. H. Stavert. In the last of the three services Mr. Stavert was assisted by Rev. A. N. Silva who was in attendance upon Mrs. McLeod's funeral.

**Forged Letters From Royalty Used By Woman Swindler**  
(Associated Press)  
KARLSRUHE, July 31.—Alleged letters from ex-Kaiser William, the ex-Crown Prince, ex-Crown Princess, General Hindenburg, the ex-King of Saxony, the Pope and scores of other prominent persons figured in the prosecution of the wife of a musician at the Baden State Opera, who was sentenced to a year and a half in prison for swindling operations. Four hundred letters which the woman declared were from General Hindenburg were exhibited.  
All the letters were illegitimate and framed in such strange language that they created much amusement in the court room. The woman pretended to acquaintance with nearly all the celebrities in Germany and solicited gifts for fictitious charities in which they were said to be interested, promising that she would supply autographed letters in acknowledgment of the contributions. She supplied the letters, but an examination of them in court convinced the judge that she had manufactured them all herself and kept the contributions

**Philippine Islands Oil Search Proves Futile and Costly**

(United Press)  
SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—In the recently abandoned quest for oil on the Bondoc peninsula of the Island of Luzon in the Philippines the Standard Oil Company of California spent approximately \$1,250,000 five years of continuous and futile effort and provided an arduous and hazardous job for the party of prospectors, it was explained in a statement issued at the company's main offices here.  
"The effort in the Philippines," said the report, "has been watched with great interest by the United States government, numerous branches of which realized the vast importance of an American oil supply on the other side of the Pacific Ocean.  
"The failure to find oil at Bondoc does not prove that there is no oil in the islands. It means that there is none in the area prospected. There is oil to the north, in Japan, and to the south, in Borneo, and it may yet be found in the Philippines group, where there has been only one real drilling campaign, the one just finished.  
"The Philippines expedition," the statement pointed out, "furnishes a striking example of the hazards of the oil industry. The search for hidden deposits of petroleum is uncertain—the industry seeks and sometimes finds and sometimes doesn't. In either case the expense is great, requiring resources of vast size. There is compensation, however, for where many wildcat ventures may fail, one may succeed with profitable results. Such is the history of oil."  
"Having heard reports of favorable surface conditions on the Bondoc peninsula, the company initiated its own geological survey in 1919. In December, 1920, an expedition sailed from San Francisco for Manila. Everything necessary to life and work had to be shipped from California. The field of operations was in a wild, scarcely inhabited region of southern Luzon, well away from civilization, a tropical land of great heat and torrential rain, an area of typhoons, of fetid humanity and lurking disease, of snakes, alligators, deer and wild pigs."  
"The deepest of the several holes drilled went to a depth of 5,120 feet. Floods and other climatic extremes frequently interfered with the work."
