### MAJ. H. LEROY SHAW DIES IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, May 1 (CP)—Major H. Leroy Shaw, former chairman of the Montreal Protestant School Board and city alderman died Monday at his home in Knowlton, Que. He was 68.

A graduate of Mount Allison University, Sackville, N. S., Shaw was manager of several branches of the Bank of Nova Scotia and later became Quebec manager of the Imperial Assurance Company of Canada.

Major Shaw went overseas with the 8th Battalion during the First Great War and upon returning was appointed Montreal and district manager of the life and accident department of the Travelers' Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., holding that position until his recent retirement.

Mr. Shaw, son of the late Archibald and Francis Shaw, was born there in 1878, moving from there with his parents to Moncton and Fredericton, N.B. Four years ago he and Mrs. Shaw spent several weeks at Stanhope Beach Inn and while there he renewed acquaintance with friends and relatives at DeSable and visited his birth place Crapaud.

### EDDIE DEAN, SINGING STAR, SCORES IN 'SONG OF OLD WYOMING'

He's Eddie Dean, who makes his debut in stellar roles in PRC's colorful and dramatic "Song of Old Wyoming," which opened at the Capitol Theater yesterday and thereby served notice to the screen's tonitruous exponents of western folk songs that they should look to their laurels.
