CABBAGES
The early cabbages should go in just as soon as the danger from ordinary frost is removed. Usually the earliest of these vegetables and also the latest are the best, being very crisp which is a most desirable factor when the head is to be used in salads. Cabbages demand rich soil with a good supply of moisture. They must be grown quickly or they will not head satisfactory. On this account a pinch of nitrate of soda, which is one of the most quickly available fertilizers that we have, is advisable at transplanting time, with a side-dressing or two at intervals of a fortnight during the first month of growth. Early cabbage plants, either home-grown from seed or bought as plants from the greenhouse man, are one of the earliest crops to be put in the open ground. They should go into rows two and a half feet apart and about fifteen inches apart in the row for proper development. They must be cultivated frequently and if possible liberally sprinkle with wood ashes or some of the patent preparations carried by every seed house will be found effective.

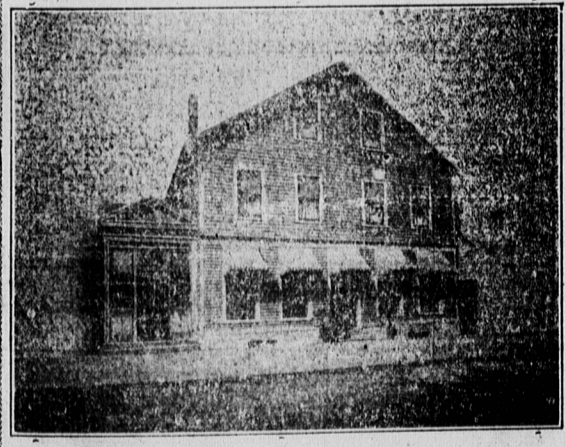

Bad advertising is a waste of money to the advertiser, and the papers must appreciate people who can advertise well enough to get results; if profits are not earned, the advertising cannot last. Probably the most certain way to waste money is to attempt to advertise a bad article. If your produce does not advertise itself to the consumer and his friends once he has used it, your advertising expenditure is not likely to be very lucrative.

"In a competition recently promoted by one of our papers to encourage amateur advertisers no fewer than 3,600 entries for Bovril advertisements were sent in. Some of the suggestions we have used in our publicity work; some we have not, although they have given us a good deal of private amusement. One suggestion, accompanied by an appropriate sketch, showed a Bovril bottle knocking the letter "L" out of the word "influenza."
