H. R. H. THE PRINCE OF WALES VISITS PRESIDENT IN SICK ROOM

The Prince Takes Part in Several Functions During His Stay in Washington. Places Wreath on Washington's Tomb. Sir Robert Borden Calls on Prince.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—President Wilson, propped up in the big bed in which the late King Edward VII slept when he visited the United States greeted the Prince of Wales today. The Prince was taken to the President's sickroom after he had tea with Mrs. Wilson and the President's daughters, Miss Margaret Wilson and Mrs. Frances B. Sawyer. The visit to the White House followed a motor trip to Mount Vernon, where the Prince laid a wreath on Washington's tomb and planted a young cedar before his resting place.

oldest church edifice in the city, Methodism lived and flourished in Charlottetown for more than half a century before the foundations of this building were laid. The first Methodist Chapel was built in 1810 on the north side of Richmond Street, between Queen and Pownall Streets. At that period when Charlottetown was a mere village, and the early settlers were themselves only beginning to establish houses in a new land, the work of building a place of worship involved considerable sacrifice. However, to quote an authority of the day: "After much deliberation they determined to build a chapel 40 by 30 feet, and a dwelling house for the preacher." The building erected at that time was used until 1833 when it became too small, and the Society purchased the land on the corner of Prince and Richmond Streets, where the Heartz Memorial Hall now stands. Here they put up a building which was occupied until the Brick Church was erected in 1864.

CIVIL SERVANTS MUST "HIT CLOCK"

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Civil servants employed in the departments, offices here may soon find themselves called upon to "punch the clock on their arrival at and departure from work. Of late Government employees have been required to report the times of their comings and goings by signing books of which the deputy heads of departments are custodians. Now the civil service commission has reported in favor of the installation of time clocks in Government offices and an order in council has been passed by the cabinet instructing the public works department to make enquiries as to the cost of the necessary clocks.

FURTHER WAGE INCREASES FOR CANADIAN RAILWAY MEN

Demand for Increase of 17 cents per hour Compromised by Additions Ranging from Four to Nine Cents. 3500 Canadian Railway Men Affected.

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—It is announced by the Canadian Railway War Board that an agreement providing for increases in rates of pay and certain changes in working conditions was signed today by the Board, acting on behalf of the railways concerned and by the officials of Division No. 4. Negotiations which culminated in the agreement completed today were commenced in May last. The employees asked for a general increase of 17 cents per hour. The new agreement provides for an increase of 4 cents per hour to men engaged in locomotive work and 9 cents per hour for those engaged in the car repair shops. These rates effective from May last. Changes in rates pertaining to working conditions go into effect on the first proximo. The new agreement affects approximately 35,000 railway employees in Canada.

P. E. I. SHEEP BREEDERS IN ANNUAL SESSION

Well Attended Meeting Yesterday in Agricultural Hall of Sheep and Cattle Interests.

The annual meeting of the P. E. Island Sheep Breeders Association was held in the Agricultural Hall yesterday. There was a very fair representation of sheep-raisers from various parts of the Province. The president, Mr. P. A. Farquharson occupied the chair. The minutes were read and approved and the annual report of the Association was read and adopted. This report showed the number of sheep insured in the Association during the past year, the amount received in insurance and the amount paid out for losses, to those who had sheep killed by dogs. The report of co-operative wool sales was then read by the Secretary. This report was very favorably received and showed that a total of 63,523 pounds had been marketed co-operatively by the farmers of the Province during the last season. The average price per pound received by the grower was 62½ cents. Matters relative to insurance of sheep, co-operative marketing of wool and lambs, and other subjects of importance to the sheep raisers of the Province were then discussed. Two new directors were appointed for the next year, viz:—Mr. Angus Walker, Launcheon, for King's County and Mr. Cephus Nunn, Winsloe, for Queen's. Among those present at the meeting were Hon. W. M. Lea, Commissioner of Agriculture and other members of the Department Staff, Messrs W. H. McGregor, who is Provincial Director of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Cephas Nunn, and Elijah Saunders, Winsloe, S. C. Stewart, Dunstaffing, Charles McLean, Clyde River; John R. Dinis, Charlottetown; George Crockett, York, Harry Hyde, Cornwall; Peter K. McFadyen, Bonshaw; D. F. McCormack, Launcheon; Parvin Cass, North River; Allen S. Frizzle, Royalty, and others. A more detailed report of this meeting will appear later. The members of the Provincial Ayrshire Breeders Club met at the same time as this meeting and discussed matters of general interest to their Association.

Disfranchisement Of Defaulters

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Disfranchisement of defaulters under the M. S. A. will probably be one of the features of the new election act to be introduced at the next session of Parliament. The old election act was temporarily superseded by the war time election act, while this in turn gave way to the Dominion bye election act last spring. The new naturalization law will not permit a woman to vote unless she is naturalized as well as her husband.

Prince of Wales To Travel Incognito

EX-PREMIER HEARST'S VALEDICTORY TO THE PEOPLE OF ONTARIO

Gratefully Recognizes Staunch Support Given His Government by the Great Majority of the People of Ontario and Declares Welfare of the Province will be His Dearest Wish.

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—Upon quitting his office as the Prime Minister of Ontario yesterday afternoon to make way for Premier Drury who takes charge today, Sir William Hearst issued the following valedictory: "In retiring from office I have nothing to add to what I have already said, save that I recognize the staunch support for good measures which the government has received during its term of office from the great majority of the people of Ontario. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve this great province particularly during the strenuous war period through which we have just passed and the future prosperity and happiness of Ontario will be my dearest wish."

FINLAND REPRESENTATIVES ADMITTED TO THE LABOR CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Finland is to be admitted to the International Labor Conference on the same conditions "as obtain in the case of other countries which have not adhered to the covenant of the League of Nations." The end of the two days debate on the majority and minority reports of the committee on administration ended in a substitute motion presented by L. C. Christie of the Canadian Delegation on behalf of Hon. N. W. Rowell who was unable to be in attendance at this afternoon's sitting of the conference. Mr. Rowell had presented the minority report of the committee at Paris was read stating that while the Austrian Government would be unable to send its own representatives to the conference it transmitted its best wishes for success. The conference adjourned till Monday afternoon.

DECORATIONS PRESENTED TO ISLAND HEROES

Notable Function in Legislative Council Chamber Yesterday When Officers and Men and One Nursing Sister Received Medals, Etc.

The Legislative Council Chamber was the scene of a memorable function at 1 o'clock yesterday when some seventeen decorations won by Prince Edward Island soldiers and one Nursing Sister in the Great War were presented to them and to the next of kin of other brave lads who had won them and made the Great Sacrifice. There was a large number of citizens present including many of the parents and other relatives of those who received the decorations as well as the officers of the local depot and the clergy. His Honor Lieutenant Governor McKinnon presided and in a few words told the object of the gathering. He referred to the different decorations to be presented remarking that the valor of Island soldiers had won for them not only recognition at the hands of the British Government, but from Italy and Belgium as well. His Honor stated that it had been expected that His Excellency the Governor General was coming here to present the decorations but for some reason he had been unable to come. His Honor congratulated the winners upon the honors which they had so deservedly won and hoped they would live long to enjoy them. Presentations were made to the following:—

In the case of the late Major A. T. McKay, the deceased officer's mother came forward and received the decoration and in the case of the late Pte. C. J. Nicholson, the father, Mr. D. M. Nicholson, was present and received it. Mrs. P. Gaudet also received the Military Medal won by her son, the late Sergt. F. Gaudet. As each officer and soldier came forward to receive his decoration he was applauded.

Premier Bell, at the close of the presentation spoke briefly first inviting those who had been decorated to a luncheon at the Rose and Grey at 1.15. He expressed pleasure at being present at the function, just held and spoke of the victory achieved and the tremendous price which had been paid to secure the peace which all now enjoy. He paid tribute to the heroism and valor of the sons of Canada and pointed out that the very soil upon which we tread is only ours today through the heroism and valor of Canadian men and women such as were honored on the present occasion. Nursing Sister Nicholson, who received the Royal Red Cross is the daughter of Mr. Donald Nicholson, M. P., and Mrs. Nicholson of this city. The Assembly Chamber was appropriately decorated for the occasion with the national colors. The decorations were brought here from Halifax the previous night by Lieut. DesBrisay an officer of the Headquarters Staff. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, was accompanied by his private Secretary Captain Edward Palmer and his aides-de-camp, Col. S. R. Jenkins and Major Bartlett. The proceedings closed with the National Anthem.
