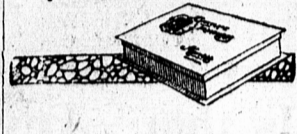

**Official Report of The National Trotting Association**

The Joint Rule Committee of the National and American Trotting Associations met at Canton, Ohio, Saturday, December 18, 1920. The following amendments were adopted to make the rules of the two Associations uniform.  
Rule 2, Section 10, defining a winrace, amended by adding the following:—"except as provided in Rule 3, Section 5, defining three heat plan races, amwinrace read as follows:—"A winrace is the fastest time made by the winning horse in a public race or in an event in which he stood best in the summary, except as provided in Rule 3, Section 6 and Rule 7, Section 6."  
Rule 3, Section 5, defining three heat plan races, amended by inserting the words "if there are two horses eligible to start" after the word "event" in the fifth line, making the sentence read as follows:—"In that event, if there are two horses eligible to start, they shall go a fourth heat to determine the winner."  
Rule 3, Section 6, defining the point system, amended by making the last sentence read as follows:—"The fastest time made by the winner in first, or if not a heat winner in second position, shall constitute a winrace." The following sentence was also added:—"Where two horses have the same number of points for first place, the horse standing best in the summary under the old placing system as defined in Rule 30, Section 8 shall acquire the winrace."  
Rule 7, Section 2, amended by adding the following words to the last sentence:—"but winraces made on the closing date shall be no bar," making the sentence read as follows:—"The member shall fix the date of eligibility by stating same in its published conditions but winraces made on the closing date shall be no bar."  
Rule 7, Sections 6 and 7 struck out and the following substituted as Section 6:—"A horse with a winrace shall be allowed, whether raced or not, two seconds for each calendar year, but the allowance shall not exceed six seconds until he reaches it or wins a race in faster time than the class to which his time allowance makes him eligible. A horse winning a race in faster time than the class to which his time allowance made him eligible shall thereafter be considered as having acquired a new winrace and be classified the same as a horse without a time allowance. When a horse with a winrace made on a mile track within four seconds of it on a half mile track, if he was entitled to any time allowance under this rule he forfeits same and shall be classified by his winrace on each course. A nominator is required to claim time allowance when making entry."

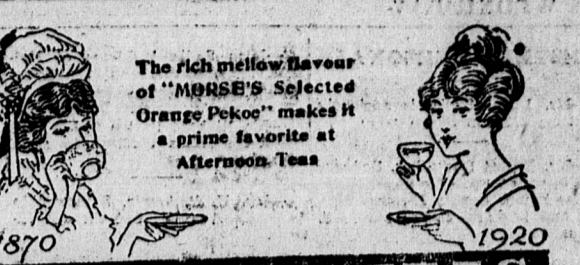
