FIRMER TREND IN MONTREAL STOCK MARKET

MONTREAL, Aug 8—A firmer trend was displayed by Montreal Stock Exchange listings during today's session which was practically devoid of any definite trend. Sales volume was again comparatively light although slightly in excess of yesterday's total, approximately 12,000 shares changing hands.

While London and Toronto markets were reopened after the long week-end holiday in both centres, the effect on the Montreal market was not particularly pronounced. Trades continued to hold aloof although the big business news was again constructive.

Price changes were stronger at the close after a firm trend had been felt throughout the session. There was no pressure and stocks drifted for the most part.

International Nickel displayed some strength on steady buying. After touching 20.25 in the morning it closed at 20.20 up 95 cents. Brazilian Tracoin was 1-4 higher at 14 1-4 while Montreal Power moved up 1-2 at 38. Canadian Pacific Railway eased 1-4 at 16 3-4.

Community Work Great Success

OTTAWA, Aug. 8—(C.P.)—Eric Muncester in the current issue of the organ of the Canadian Council on Child and Family Welfare records how Rosemount, Montreal, has been virtually transformed by an amazingly successful community welfare scheme.

With garden-rakes and hoes, spades and 4 bright-tinted forks, scores of girls and young women of Rosemount, one of Montreal's most important industrial suburbs, have sallied forth into small gardens this year with a determination to grow more and better vegetables or know the reason why.

The big majority of these girls never grew a garden in their lives, only knew vegetables as the finished product sold across the counter or in the market. Yet short of an unprecedented drought the gardens will succeed. Rosemount people have been enjoying and will enjoy all summer the seasonal vegetables as they become ready for the table at a lower cost than they have ever known.

These young women went forth with supreme confidence. They had spent hours and hours each week since December studying gardening. It had been brought home to these erstwhile stenographers and store-shocks that it was well within the range of their abilities to produce their own food, or some of it, and they accepted the challenge.

This gardening activity, Muncester explains, is only one aspect of an outstanding achievement in community welfare work. Rosemount had been hard hit by the depression, probably the hardest hit of any ward in the city. As was inevitable everywhere, human nature being what it is, certain psychological reactions were beginning to show themselves in the latter part of 1932.

At this stage the Junior League of Montreal sought the most advantageous way in which it could help. They offered \$1,000 with no strings attached and a committee was duly named to share in the development of the project along recreational, occupational and educational lines.

PRODUCE

MONTREAL, Aug 8—A dull day was experienced on the Montreal dairy and produce market today with butter, potatoes and eggs holding unchanged and cheese easing slightly. No 14 butter in cartons or less held at 19 1/2 cents a pound with occasional quotations of 19 1/2 cents. A total of only 227 boxes was offered for sale.

The potato market remained at \$1 per 80 pound bag of new Quebecs and \$1.30 for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island green mountains in similar quantities. Sales in New Brunswick potatoes, which were introduced last week, were too light to set any prices.
