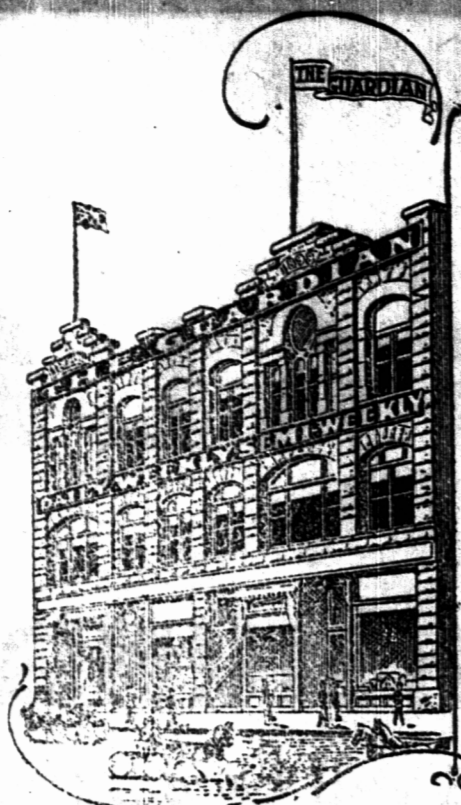

**IRON AND STEEL.**

Few of the Canadian industries attract more notice than those which have to do with iron and steel, and yet the public information in regard to these works is comparatively vague. Most of our readers have heard of the Dominion Iron and steel works at Sydney, the great steel works at Sault Ste Marie, the Nova Scotia steel works at New Glasgow, and possibly others. There are in all nine companies in Canada which last year received bounties on iron and steel. These include besides those already mentioned, the Canadian Iron Furnace Company, at Three Rivers; the Midland Iron Works; the Deseronto Iron Company; the Electric Reduction Company; the Hamilton Iron and Steel Company and John McDougall & Co.

The federal government has done a good deal to encourage these industries, having paid a bounty on the pig iron produced in the country since 1864. In that year \$44,000 was paid in bounties. The annual payments fell off to \$20,000 in 1891 and

stood at \$80,000 in 1897. Since then there has been a rapid increase in production, and the bounty paid on pig iron in 1901 was \$381,250. Down to April last the bounty on pig iron made from native ore was \$3 per ton, and on pig made from foreign ore \$2 per ton, and on steel \$3 per ton. Under the Fielding tariff these bounties will diminish from year to year until for the year 1906-7 the bounties on pig iron will be 60 and 40 cents per ton respectively for the product from native and foreign ore, and 60 cents per ton on steel. By that time it is hoped that these important industries will no longer need bounties but will be sufficiently protected by the customs duties on imported iron and steel.

The Dominion is yet very far from being independent of other countries in the matter of iron and steel. We consume annually about 800,000 tons of iron and the products thereof, and this consumption is increasing more rapidly than the country's producing capacity. At present the products of Canadian furnaces do not supply more than 30 per cent of the home demand. In other words we are still indebted to foreign sources for more than two thirds of the iron and steel consumed in the country. From this it will be seen that there is a vast field for expansion in the iron and steel industry of the Dominion. With our great resources of native ore and coal the time will come in the not very distant future when Canada will not only be able to supply her own wants in this regard but will take her place among those supplying the markets of the outside world.

Seldom has an exchange of pulpits called forth more appreciative notices in two cities than that made last Sabbath by Rev. T. F. Fullerton of this city and Rev. L.G. McNeill of St. Andrew's Church, St. John. The St. John press gave extended and very appreciative notices of Mr. Fullerton's visit and discourses and Rev. Mr. McNeill's visit and ministrations while here were equally enjoyed.

Baldwin, the arctic explorer, who was very thoroughly equipped for the dash to the pole, and who set out some two years ago has returned to Norway unsuccessful. Peary, who wintered in the far north is expected to be heard from within a month or two. It is extremely improbable that Peary's report will be any more satisfactory than that of previous explorers. "Baffled but not beaten," is Baldwin's word, and he intends to try again.

The King by his Privy Council for Canada has proclaimed next Saturday, Coronation Day, a public holiday. The Guardian has been asked whether the Provincial Government will also proclaim it, so as to make clear some doubts as to the day being a holiday in legal and financial matters.

The latest Canadian census bulletin tells that there are 901 persons in the Dominion over 95 years of age. Of these 538 are women and only 423 men. Just why 115 more women than men should live to the great age which these have attained is not explained, but the last census only confirms what has been before known in that regard. Our own Province stands first in the Dominion in the matter of its population over 70 years of age, having a larger proportion than any other Province. This may be partly brought about by the large exodus of young persons from the Island in recent years. A regrettable feature is that since 1871 there has been a steady decrease in the proportion of children under one year old in this Province and Ontario. The falling off in the baby crop is probably due to the exodus from our shores in years past of so many young men and women of marriageable age.
