TWO-THIRDS OF QUEBEC "DRY"

MONTREAL, March 13.—That the province of Quebec, having already sixty-nine per cent. of its communities "dry" was well on its way to prohibition, was declared by Secretary Roberts at this afternoon's meeting of the Dominion Alliance convention at Dominion square Methodist church, Ald. Carter presiding.

The statistics given by Secretary Roberts showed that of the communities in the province sixty-nine per cent. were "dry" and thirty-one per cent. had a license. The number of communities without a license was 661, compared with 295 with a license. Ald. Carter welcomed the delegates to the thirty-second annual convention of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Alliance, which had been an important year in the Alliance's history, and he instanced the delegation to Quebec last April, which had been the most influential delegations in the history of the alliance, and had been received with sympathy by the provincial government. As regards results, they were glad to say that on May 1 next there would be a general early closing movement throughout the province, except in Montreal and Quebec.

and others, some information was promised at a future day by the Premier and Hon. Mr. Cumiskey.

The House then resumed the adjourned debate on the Queen's Coat of Arms Bill, Mr. Cox in the chair.

THE PREMIER said that so far as he knew the Dominion had not bought any lands for Experimental Farms in the Province outside of the Central Farm at Ottawa. They had taken their own lands in the Northwest, New Brunswick had no Experimental Farm.

MR. MATHIESON wanted to know why it was necessary to pass this legislation at the Dominion had not asked for it. He has read from the Auditor-General's report that the Dominion had bought private land in Saskatchewan and paid \$8,000 for it, notwithstanding the enormous subsidies given to that Province. He claimed that in every matter between the Dominion and the Province the interests of the Province had been sacrificed, and now the government were preparing to offer a gift before it was asked.

HON. MR. RICHARDS thought the Dominion certainly expect to get this lot on the same terms as they got the present farm. They wanted a larger farm, and would not have consented but with the understanding that they should get this additional six acres. They offered to pay all over \$100 per acre, up to \$150 per acre. He thought the Provincial government was in duty bound to lease them this land.

MR. McLEAN thought no one would suppose the Dominion should pay as much for land in Saskatchewan.

GALVESTON, Texas, March 13.—A race riot was precipitated yesterday by the stabbing of Winfield Joel, a soldier from the camp at Fort Crockett, by an unidentified negro in a resort. One Mexican and four negroes were severely beaten and the house in front of which the stabbing occurred was set on fire and burned to the ground. The entire police force of the city was called out to quell the disturbances.

Joel, who is a member of the 144th Company Coast Artillery, stationed at Fort Moutrie, Charleston, S. C., was seriously wounded, but probably will recover. The police patrolling the beat was stabbed in the back by another soldier during the melee immediately following the wounding of Joel. He was not seriously hurt.

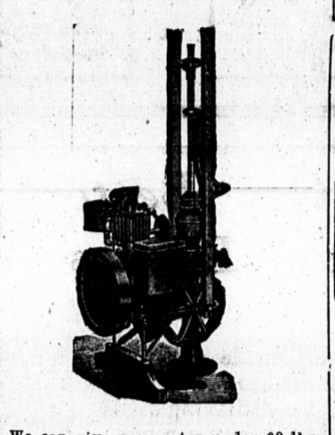
