REVISION COVENANT

PARIS, April 14.—An official sum- mary of the revised covenant of the League of Nations issued last night makes specific mention of the Monroe Doctrine with respect to its bearing on the future activities of the League. It says the covenant does not affect the validity of international engage- ments such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe Doctrine for securing the maintenance of peace.

The League, says the statement will include all belligerent and neutral states named in a document annexed to the covenant, and in the future any self governing country whose admission is approved by two thirds of the States already members of the League providing it has kept its obligations. A state may withdraw from the League on giving two years notice and states which signify their dissent from amendments approved by all states on the council and a majority of these in the assembly are not bound by them but in such case cease to be members of the League.

Mandatories for the German Colonies and the territories of the Ottoman Empire are provided. These colonies and the territories are to be administered by the League which will exercise general supervision.

The following official summary of the covenant of the League of Nations was issued this afternoon: The League of Nations is founded in order to promote international co-operation and to secure peace. The League will include

"A" The belligerent States named in a document annexed to the covenant.

"B" All the neutral states so named and

"C" in the future any self governing country whose admission is approved by two thirds of the States already members of the League. A state may withdraw from the League providing it has kept its obligations to date of giving two years notice.

PARIS, April 12.—Reparations and the Saar Valley were the subjects under discussion by the Big Four this afternoon. The reparation plan was approved as previously outlined in these despatches and the Saar problem will be solved by an economic agreement that will not militate against German sovereignty.

Tonight the committee on capacity of Germany to pay completed a significant report to the reparation committee, its provisions being along lines summarized in The Mail and Empire previously. There is no attempt to fix the total amount that Germany can pay, but the methods of securing revenues are indicated. Most of the money available for reparational payments will be derived from exports.

Germany is to have complete economic freedom after the war, so that her ability to pay shall not be hampered. Although it is not said so in as many words, the capacity report makes it plain that Germany, to pay damages will have to repudiate or defer for an indefinite time her own war loans.

It announced this several weeks ago is inevitable and the experts find obligations. Payments on these bonds no junior to the war damage, and that item will absorb Germany's financial capacity.

It is by no means improbable that the allies will assist Germany to float an international loan.

SAXONY WAR MINISTER

MURDERED BY MOB

COPENHAGEN, April 14.—Herr Nouring, War Minister in the Government of Saxony, was killed at Dresden yesterday by disgruntled soldiers to whom the Minister had refused a hearing. The war ministry was stormed by demonstrators who dragged out Herr Nouring and threw him into the Elbe where he was shot and killed as he tried to swim to the bank.

An order had been issued by Herr Nouring to the effect that the wounded in future should receive only peace time pay. Five or six hundred men then formed a procession to the war Ministry and sent a deputation to see the Minister who refused however to receive them. Upon this the crowd incited by communistic speakers stormed the entrance to the building. The sentries used their weapons but were overpowered. Government troops were summoned but they declared they would not attack the crowd and they marched off after surrendering.

DOINGS AROUND THE CITY WATERFRONT

A trip down to the water front in this city is very interesting on a fine day. There are extensive repairs being made to the coal shed on the Railway wharf. Several benches of piles are to be driven all about the outside of the shed on which the foundation for the shed is to be laid. According to plans this coaling shed when finished will be second to none in the Maritime Provinces. The whole work is under the superintendance of Mr. Townsend the bridge and building master of the P. E. I. R. branch.

Next in order is the old steam Navigation wharf where preparations are being made for a thorough overhauling. This wharf is now owned by the enterprising firm of Bruce Stewart and Company. The C. G. R. Steamship Northumberland lies at this wharf where she is at present undergoing extensive repairs. Most of her deck is being renewed. The hull and houses are receiving a good coat of paint. Machinery is also being overhauled and put in first class condition. The genial engineer Mr. Chas. Lumley is in charge of repairs to engines while Captain Knowlton Inspector of carteries and Government steamers is the general superintendent.

The good tug "Rona" is also lying at this wharf and is also being thoroughly overhauled. We are pleased to see Capt. Byleva of this tug back again to take charge of his ship. A complete new stern is being put on this boat and seldom are such repairs as this undertaken without hauling the vessel out of the water. The new method will certainly save time and money. The timbers appear to be quite rotten, but careful preparation in securing lumber during the winter season is evident by the large number of pieces of ship timber lying around the wharf.

The Dredge No. 9 and scows are also receiving attention. A new device being installed in this dredge, a very simple contrivance the dipper boom weighing over ten tons, at the "A" frame to which the boom is attached which also weighs over twelve tons is swung in the air to enable the deck to be placed under the castings. This reflects much credit on Capt. J. N. McDonald who is in charge of repairs to dredge and tug boat. The Guardian representative was informed by Mr. Andrew McNair the mechanical foreman of Bruce Stewart & Co. that Mr. McDonald is deserving of more credit than is generally understood by the public for the many improvements made in the dredges since taking charge of this office. One of the dredges in particular has been improved so that she is now capable of doing five times the amount of work which she did formerly. Looking for evidence to prove this we find that during the four years next preceding his appointment, the total amount of dredging done in this province was

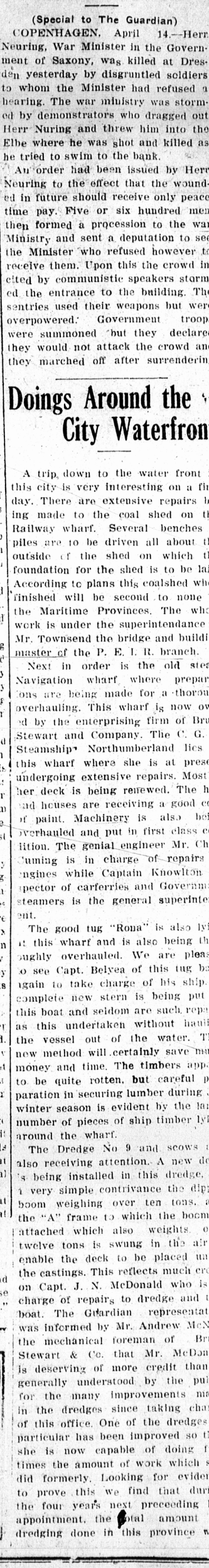
