Canadian Fish Catch Worth More

OTTAWA, July 26.—The Canadian catch of sea fish in the first half of 1929 had a landed value of \$9,364,822. This was an increase of \$500,000 over 1928 figures despite a reduction of 9,000,000 pounds in the weight of the catch which was 280,290,000 pounds.

Statistics compiled by the Dominion Fisheries Branch show that there was an increase of 4,710,300 pounds in the catch in June, as compared with June, 1928, and an increase of \$163,283 in the landed value of the catch to the fishermen.

The catch on the Pacific coast was less by some 3,100,000 pounds than that in June of last year but on the Atlantic coast there was an increase of more than 7,800,000 pounds. The total sea fish catch on the Atlantic coast in June was 80,593,000 pounds. The increase of 7,822,700 pounds over the total for June 1928, was due to the greater success of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island operations. The Nova Scotia catch was 58,420,200 pounds as against 43,899,200 pounds in the previous June. In Prince Edward Island the fishermen landed 4,160,800 pounds while in June 1928 their catch was only 4,142,400 pounds. On the other hand, the New Brunswick catch was slightly less than in June of a year ago—14,152,400 pounds as compared with 14,329,700 pounds—and Quebec's landings were only 7,589,600 pounds as against 10,399,000 pounds.

AND so Wicks immediately proposed that they should have a swearing match for fifty pounds (\$250) Lord Mohun's groom to act as judge. The preliminaries settled, they fell to. For a quarter of an hour they swore in a way that fairly astonished both. Then the groom, requested to name the winner, said:

"Well, My Lord, your honor swears as well as ever I heard any gentleman of quality in my life but, indeed, to give the strange gentleman his due, he has done better than yourself, and won the wager."

ANOTHER highwayman, James Whitney, with his followers, robbed a clergyman of ten pounds (\$50). The humor seized them that he should preach them a sermon. The divine rose to the occasion. He took for his text the word "Theft"—which showed great daring on his part. Despite its extreme pointedness the robbers approved of the sermon, and declaring that the preacher deserved his fee, presented him with shillings (\$2.50) out of his ten pounds.

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Baker of Summerside, have returned home after a pleasant visit to relatives and friends in Milton.

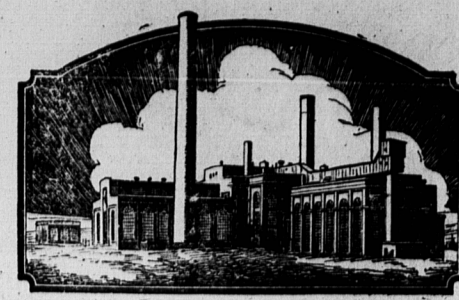
Miss Julia White is spending her vacation at her home in Milton.

CAPTAIN MOSES NICKERSON AGAIN

BOSTON, July 26.—The proposed visit of Premier Ramsay MacDonald, of England, to the United States, for the purpose of cementing more firmly Anglo-American relations, affords an opportunity for settlement of a fisherman's question, Captain M. H. Nickerson, of Melrose, believes. Captain Nickerson is a veteran fisherman and is well known in Canada and the Maritime Provinces.

In a communication to the Boston Post, Captain Nickerson says: "I deeply sympathize with fishermen of all shores, since I have shared the common hardships and encountered some dangers of the calling. I think it extremely hard that New England fish boats are not allowed to enter the harbors or ports of the Canadian-Atlantic provinces, except for shelter or in distress.

"Is that what they call good neighborliness? I am a loyal Canadian, but I want to live on friendly terms with the neighbors. The craft of no other nation are served in that manner. My people do not approve of it. That stand-off policy was adopted only six years ago by invoking an old effete convention of George III, whose ministry, subservient to his will, had just concluded two wars with the young United States.

"Even that arbitrary instrument, over 100 years old, stipulates that the provisions of such treaty shall

not apply to any "Prince, Power or State in amity with his Majesty."

"It may be a situation not well known to the Washington executive, Premier MacDonald and Lloyd George both announce themselves as favorable to more friendly relations. If the former comes this way, as I hope he will, we shall surely find out whether there is complete "amity" between the States and his Majesty as represented by the premier of the workmen's government"

OHIOANS SIGH FOR FRESH FISH

BOSTON, June 27.—Ohio and other central states may have some advantages that are not possessed by the New England states but in one respect the New Englanders have aroused the envy of the Ohioans—fish.

The envy of Ohio is contained in an editorial published by the Ohio State Journal:

"We do not envy New England her conscience half so much as we envy her sea food. Her conscience, we often think, has been somewhat over-emphasized, like football, but her fresh fish are fine and firm. Fish from the cold depths of the Atlantic are better than fish from the Pacific, where the influence of the Japanese current, by making life too comfortable and easy, interferes with the highest development of character.

"As compared with the fresh mackerel of New England, the boasted barracuda of California is like so much corn mush and the California lobster, poor thing, has not even any claws to suck. There are good fish in the Great Lakes, whitefish and trout, but they have not the quality of the fish from the Atlantic and, since they do not contain iodine, their medicinal value in this great gutter belt is small.

"In a Massachusetts newspaper we find a fish market advertisement which makes us homesick for New England, despite her textile troubles and her Power Trust affliction. . . . All these products of the Atlantic Ocean are shipped to this garden spot of the world and arrive in pretty good shape, but the magic is in the freshness. We vision the glad day when they will arrive here by airplane a few hours after they were taken from the Atlantic's chill waters. What a compensation for all the noisy ills of the machine age! 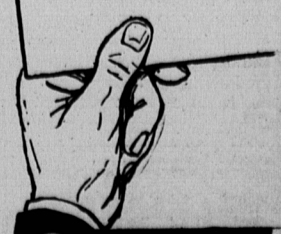
