DUPLESSIS SNOWED UNDER

Freedom And Peace Key-note Of New Order Dominion Minister Speaks Strongly Against "Patchwork Peace" In Talk To Empire.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(CP)—Anthony Eden, Dominion Secretary, broadcast to the Empire tonight that "a patchwork peace and an armed truce must be utterly unacceptable to us and therefore the Allies would prosecute the war until we have finally made an end of the system that has grown to power on breaking promises and glorifying force."

Outlining the unity of purpose manifest in the Empire's war effort, the former Foreign Secretary pronounced Great Britain's aim, and the aim of the whole Allied front, to be "an international order that shall be respectful, religious toleration, the denial and not the worship of aggressive nationalism; liberty, security and peace."

"It is not because we love war," declared the statesman who himself served in France for four years in the first Great War, "but because we hate it that we are determined to go on this time until we have finally made an end."

With the immediate response which came from the overseas Empire on the outbreak of the war will be fresh in their memory, Mr. Eden said the British government had great store in the discussions to be held very shortly in London between Dominion Ministers and the British authorities.

Mr. Eden spoke of the scheme by which Canada will be used as the air force training centre of the Empire as an action with no parallel in the world's history.

United Church 'Regrets' Action By Ministers TORONTO, Oct. 25.—(CP)—The sub-executive of the United Church of Canada, following a special meeting today to consider a manifesto in which 75 Ministers of the church opposed the present war, issued a statement declaring "our regret at the action of the signatories in making their manifesto public."

"The signatories of this manifesto, however sincere, have gone far beyond the limits of what is wise and proper in time of war," said the statement, issued through Rev. Dr. Gordon A. Sisco of Toronto, secretary of the sub-executive of the general council of the church.

"The sub-executive would take this opportunity of proclaiming afresh the entire and unfailing loyalty of the United Church of Canada to His Majesty, the King, and its steady purpose to support him in the present dire struggle in every way which is open and proper to the church," the statement continued.

Last Friday at Toronto 75 ministers of the church met and expressed public disapproval of "this (Continued on page 3, Col 3)

NAZI PATROLS TEST FRENCH LINES IN WEST Observers See Germans Planning Attack From Troop Concentrations.

By Taylor Henry Associated Press Staff Writer PARIS, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Reinforced German patrols were reported testing French lines at the extreme northern tip of the western front tonight in a series of feeler attacks. Heavy concentrations of troops were noted elsewhere. A French communiqué said a Nazi thrust against French positions near Aachen had been repulsed.

German and French patrols were active along the entire northern flank from the Luxembourg border to the Rhine, where the French are guarding against a sudden German offensive.

French advances received by the high command said the Germans had massed at least 90 divisions on this flank along a 100-mile front. This places approximately 1,500,000 men in the area.

The 90 divisions included troops actually in the Siegfried line and those holding advance frontier positions. The troop concentrations were considered extraordinarily large unless the Germans are planning an attack.

A military observer said the German force could be lined up shoulder-to-shoulder three-deep along the 100-mile flank.

Premier Daladier had a long conference late today with General Maurice Gustav Gamelin, commander-in-chief of the Allied force.

Reports of new German troop concentrations behind the Siegfried line led military observers to believe the Germans might be planning an attack in force despite bad weather along the front.

Switzerland from Berlin by way of Adversland said Gen. Walter Von Brauchitz, German chief-of-staff was making a detailed inspection of the German lines near Saarbruecken.

German local attacks have been directed in this sector at trying to drive the French from one of their firm positions. The French command was said to have considered the possibility of a German attack seriously enough to rush fortifications along the frontier.

A general staff communiqué this morning said that "on the whole the night has been quiet," and noted "patrol and artillery activity to the west of the Saar."

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R.A.F. Planes In Scouting Flights Over Germany Urban Centres Including Berlin Visited By British Planes—Further Trade Expansion With Russia Contemplated.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(CP)—For the second time since the war began the Air Ministry disclosed today that Royal Air Force planes carried out scouting expeditions over great urban centres in Germany, including Berlin. One of the centres reconnoitered was Magdeburg, site of a branch of the Krupp munitions works. Another was the key port of Hamburg.

At the same time the country heard that Britain plans to extend its trade with Soviet Russia, thus adding further conviction to reports that Moscow is planning to maintain its neutrality in the war and to carry on its trade as extensively as possible.

Richard Butler, Foreign Affairs Under-Secretary, told the House of Commons that "the possibility of following up the recent agreement for exchange of timber against rubber and tin, by further arrangements suitable to war conditions, is now under examination."

An authoritative source hinted that these negotiations might open tomorrow at the Board of Trade. The Soviet Ambassador, Ivan Maisky, called at the Foreign Office today at the request of the Foreign Secretary, Viscount Halifax, and a lengthy conference ensued.

Naval observers, meanwhile, speculated on yesterday's sinkings of four merchant craft in the vicinity of Gibraltar, and some quarters suggested that an entire convoy had been successfully attacked.

In these sinkings Britain lost 17,671 tons of ships in a single day, bringing her losses thus far to 46 ships.

News agency reports headed "British steamer (Stonegate) sunk by pocket battleship" were passed for publication. Reports from Oslo, Norway, yesterday said the 5,944-ton freighter (Continued on page 3, Col 4)

Paul Gouin Comments On Defeat MONTREAL, Oct. 25.—(CP)—The 41-year-old Montreal lawyer said "We have fulfilled our duty according to our conscience. How many, I ask you can make the same statement?"

"We did not save the country because the country did not want us to," he said. "But we did save something sacred—the honor of the French-Canadian race. Electoral defeat and sacrifice of our opponents do not mean much."

"The people of this province eventually will realize the sincerity of the warnings we gave a population which disregarded them," Gouin asserted. He said that when the people of the province "realize they have been cheated once again, the rejoicing of tonight will unhappily make way for tears of blood."

N. B. Election Rumored For November 20 SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 25.—(CP)—The Saint John Telegraph-Journal will say in its news columns tomorrow it has been learned on good authority that a Provincial Election will be held in New Brunswick on Monday, Nov. 20 and that announcement to this effect will be made officially tomorrow.

The present Liberal Administration headed by Premier Dymally was elected in June, 1935. Liberals swept the Province, gaining 13 seats, and the other five went to Conservatives. The present standing is: Liberals 39, Conservatives five, deaths having caused four vacancies.

Reich Military Leaders Meet BERLIN, Oct. 25.—Military leaders of the Reich met at the Chancellery today, and observers wondered whether the conference was concerned with Germany's avowed fight to the finish against Great Britain and France.

More than 20 generals and staff officers attended the meeting, which lasted several hours. It was assumed in foreign circles that Adolf Hitler participated in at least part of the conference.

The German press with one voice echoed Foreign Minister Joachim Von Ribbentrop's speech at Danzig last night with such assertions as "there will be no stopping now."

"The National Zeitung of Essen, which is close to Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Reich Air Minister, intimated once again that the bombs may shower on the British Isles.

"The moment has come when the war desired by Britain and itself," National Zeitung said.

Major Currencies Stage Retreat NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(CP)—Major European currencies retreated today under the leadership of the British pound which fell in relation to the United States dollar.

Some foreign exchange men as well as the general public were of the opinion that the market was overdone. The French franc declined 0.2 cent to 227.2 and the Belgian franc and Swiss franc fell 0.1 each. The Canadian dollar, at a discount of 10 1/2 per cent, was off 1-16 cent.

Thanks Electors QUEBEC, Oct. 25.—(CP)—Premier Maurice Duplessis thanked Quebec electors tonight for the "unqualified testimony of confidence" which restored to the Liberal party the reins of government in the province after 40 years before the Union Nationale landslide of 1936.

U. S. And Nazis Seek Unraveling Of Complications (By Melvin K. Whiteleather) (Associated Press Staff Writer) BERLIN, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Germany and the United States today attempted to unravel the maze of circumstances surrounding the Nazi seizure last week of the American freighter City of Flint which Germans said carried a contraband cargo for England.

It was understood that Germany sent a Marine expert to Russia seeking release of the prize crew which boarded the steamer and took her, after a stop at Tromsø, Norway, to Russia's Arctic Ocean port of Murmansk.

Victory Won On Issue Of National Unity Liberals 68, Union Nationale 15, And Action Liberale Nationale Out Of Picture, Was Verdict Of Voters.

QUEBEC, Oct. 25.—(CP)—Quebec Province today swung back to the Liberal Party—manager of its affairs for 39 years up to 1936—and turned out of office the Union Nationale Government of Premier Maurice Duplessis. The new Premier will be Hon. Adelard Godbout, scientific farmer, one-time minister of agriculture, and Premier for two months just prior to the Liberal debacle of three years ago which brought Union Nationale into power.

Today's vote was a landslide. Three years ago Union Nationale won 76 of 90 seats and held 71 at dissolution. Tonight's complete returns showed 68 Liberals counted in, 15 candidates of Union Nationale. One Independent only 15 candidates of Union Nationale. One National won, only representatives among 21 candidates of small independent groups to beat out their opponents.

The province voted in 85 constituencies today, the Assembly having been reduced to 86 seats by redistribution. The vote in one constituency—Charlevoix-Saguenay—was deferred to Nov. 16.

The third party, Action Liberale Nationale, led by Paul Gouin, never was in the running. Gouin himself was defeated in Montreal Mercier. Duplessis was elected in Three Rivers, Godbout in L'Islet.

Seven Ministers Defeated Seven of Premier Duplessis' Cabinet Ministers met defeat. They were Hon. William Tremblay, Minister of Labor; Hon. Henry Auger, Minister of Colonization; Hon. Bona Dussault, Minister of Agriculture; Hon. Joseph Blodreau, Minister of Municipal Affairs; Hon. Anatole Caron, Minister of Roads; Hon. Osmine Gagnon, Minister of Mines and Fisheries; and Hon. T. J. Coonan, Minister without portfolio.

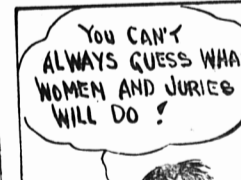
