

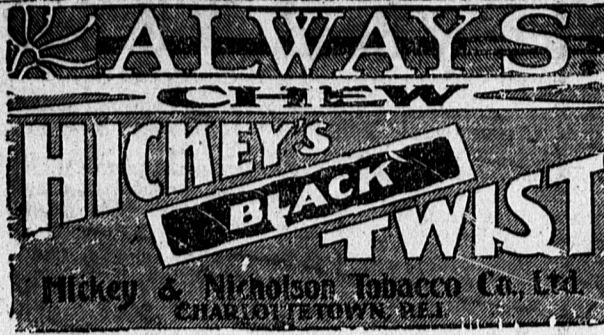

France, Sept. 26, 1918
