ISLAND SOLDIER RETURNS.—

Four hundred and twenty-two veterans of the great war arrived in Halifax Thursday from England, some of them wounded, others convalescent from sickness and some few on duty or short leave. Included in this party were thirty-five Maritime Province men. There was one Prince Edward Islander, Private R. P. Croake, of Charlottetown, who left here with the 105th Battalion.

OFFER OF HOME FOR SOLDIERS.—Mr. D. A. McKinnon, K. C., has offered the use of his home "Highlands," in the Royalty of Georgetown as a convalescent home for soldiers. The Honorable, the Minister of Militia has referred the matter to the Military Hospitals Commission who have the matter under consideration. It is a very pleasantly situated place for this benevolent object.

ACTION AT HALIFAX.—The Halifax board of control has adopted a resolution that in the judgment of the board the marked reduction which has taken place during the past few weeks in the price of flour, does not justify the further continuance of the high price now asked for bread, and that the benefit of this reduction should be extended to the consumer immediately, by reducing prices accordingly. The feeling of the board was that the resolution was very timely and should be taken up at once with the bakers.

A CORRECTION.—In referring to the death of L. M. Ferguson, inspector of telephones and telegraphs for the T. and N. C. Railway, who was accidentally electrocuted at Boston Creek, it was stated that the accident occurred on Sunday which was incorrect as it was on Friday, June 1st he was killed, the remains being forwarded to New London for burial arriving Monday, June 4th accompanied by Mr. John McLellan and Miss Nina McKenna, a friend from Toronto; and Mr. D. A. McPhee who met the party in Moncton.
