Black Marketeers Meeting all Ships.

NAPLES, Jan. 21 (CP)—Whether half a mile or a mile away from the shore, Italy's black market begins.

With cries of "Johnnie, bizziz!" the gangs swarm, smiling and impudent, "fishermen" of Naples paddle out from the war-torn shore, snaking hundreds of olive oil barrels and kegs of any ships that drop anchor while waiting for one of the few remaining, numbered with a rusted, shattered hull of a one-axis ship.

Aussies See Danger of Asiatic Disease

CANBERRA, Jan. 21 (CP)—Smuggling of animals and birds from the tropics or carcases of fuming planes could cost the Australian bloodstock and cattle industries millions of pounds, it has been warned.

This warning to Australians of the special job of safeguarding the islands has exposed pastoral pursuits, was issued recently by Major L. Richard-Bell of Sydney and R. V. S. Main of Launceston.

The officers are members of the Malaria Veterinary Survey Section of the Australian Army Veterinary Corps, recently formed for the special job of safeguarding Australia's outer defence against the penetration of foreign disease.

They said that of the range on the very threshold of Australia's shores were to be kept out, most stringent scientific precautions and an appreciation of the menace by returning troops were essential.

Of the diseases which said could be taken to Australia by insects was equine anaemia from which thousands of horses were dying in New Britain alone. Encephalomyelitis—a brain disease communicable to humans—was also mentioned.

Babies could be brought by squirrels, monkeys, dogs and other animals, while the war many complaints that could be introduced by smuggled birds. Another danger was the wide range of insects which could be introduced by insect bite is surra, caused by a blood parasite.

Major Bains, a pathologist, explained that with the importation into the islands by the Japs of horses from Manchuria, Tibet, China and Japan, a wide range of diseases unknown in Australia had been brought perilously close to the shores.

Looking for the wide range of mosquitoes and other insects unwittingly introduced into Australia in aircraft to start sweeping epidemics, he said.

Kuhn Sings a New Tune in Germany

AUGSBURG, Germany, Jan. 21 (CP)—Fritz Kuhn, the former German Minister of War, is singing a new tune in the forests of Bavaria where he is being held in custody.

Germany and the United States—Kuhn is going to be like new. He has lived in North America for 22 years since leaving Germany after serving a one year sentence in a Munich jail for larceny.

Now Kuhn is a man without a country. Kuhn pleads his love for the United States and stoutly denies that he is a Nazi.

With a shrug, Kuhn admits that he can't explain how the Bund happened to adopt the Nazis and the swastika nor how it happened to copy the Nazi storm troopers uniform.

Looking fat and fed up, Kuhn has developed a tremendous "persecution complex."

He says he was forgotten by the Nazis. "I'm absolutely through with politics. I only want to be a chemist or a professor—if I can."

He works in a dye shop at this old fort once used by Napoleon.

There have been allegations that Kuhn served as a German spy. "Absolutely not," he replied. "How could a man in the line-light like I was be a spy? Anyway, I've been in prison since 1939."

He said the paid membership in the Bund at the peak was roughly a little more than 12,000. He endeavored to picture himself as a moderate and asserted that "most of the radicals, Bundists are free and have never been arrested."

Kuhn met Hitler only once—in 1939 when he led a party of 80 Bundists and sympathizers to Germany for the Olympic games. "Ambassador, Dettl" made an appointment for me to meet Hitler," Kuhn said.

During the same trip Kuhn said he met Nazi Minister Robert Ley and some Nazi affiliated with supporting Nazi propaganda to Germans abroad but couldn't say that they were only social visits.

The Austrians Deutschen In-stitut in Stuttgart which supplied this propaganda once sent leaflets to the United States, Kuhn said, but he claimed he turned them. They sent them back and Kuhn admitted aiding in their distribution.
