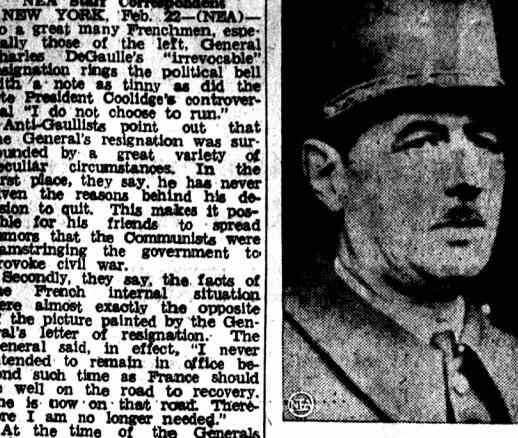

DeGaulle's Resignation Seen as Political Move to Pave Way for Return

General DeGaulle's 'irrevocable' resignation is seen as a move to end the French people's long and irksome opposition to the return of the French Republic to the political fold.

NEW YORK (AP)—To a great many Frenchmen, especially those of the left, General Charles de Gaulle's resignation rings the political bell with a note as timely as did the late President Roosevelt's controversial "I do not choose to run."

And de Gaulle's point out that the General's resignation was surrounded by a great variety of peculiar circumstances. In the first place, they say, he has never given the reasons behind his decision to quit. This makes it possible to speculate on the reasons that prompted the government to propose his resignation.

Secondly, they say, the facts of the French internal situation were almost exactly the opposite of the picture painted by the General. He said, in effect, never intended to remain in office beyond a few days, as France should be well on her way to recovery. She is now on that road. Therefore, they say, he should have resigned long ago.

At the time the General's resignation there was a very real and serious situation. It had just been resumed after a long period. French morale was low when the General assumed his post. On his head sat a heavy burden of criticism. The general attack marked importance to the fact that the General's letter of resignation was signed by the General himself, and not by a number of aides which have delivered the message to the President's campaign manager.

Out of these circumstances, De Gaulle's enemies draw this conclusion: That De Gaulle believes no government can solve the serious crisis in France in coal in support.
