MOTORMAN IS HELD FOR TRIAL

For Killing John Morrison and Heirs Want Twenty-five Thousand Damages.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.—(Special)—Henri Sansregret, motorman of the street car which killed the wealthy but eccentric Scotchman, John Morrison, some weeks ago, has been committed to the Court of King's Bench for trial on a charge of manslaughter.

The heirs of the estate have decided to take action against the street railway company for \$25,000 damages.

COLLINS' TRIAL FOR THE MURDER

Of Miss McAuley Began Yesterday—Indirect Evidence Against Prisoner

HOPEWELL CAPE, N.B., Sept. 10.—(Special)—The preliminary examination of Thomas F. Collins, charged with the murder of May Ann McAuley, opened here this morning.

The prisoner was defended by James G. Sherran of Moncton and appeared confident and unconcerned.

Premier Tweedie conducted the examination.

Mrs Ruth Leman of Elgin testified to seeing the prisoner on the day of the murder.

He told her somebody had stolen Father McAuley's horse and wagon and he was looking for them.

He had two valises and appeared greatly agitated.

John W. Garland gave similar evidence. This closed evidence for the day.

The Court resumes tomorrow morning.

DOUKHOBORS EAT LIKE OTHER DUCKS

REGINA, Alta., September 8.—Fourteen Doukhobors, incarcerated in the jail here absolutely refuse to partake of food. Nourishment has to be forced through their teeth by scientific means.

These men are leaders of the famous band that braved the prickly cactus with naked feet while they wandered in nude condition over the face of the prairies.

But humiliation has only steeled their hearts with a firmer determination, and they have resolved that if the police authorities will not allow them to turn Saskatchewan into a veritable Garden of Eden, they will starve themselves.

It was not long ago that several Doukhobor fanatics who were imprisoned in the same jail, refused to eat unless they were fed on California peaches and unwashed potatoes, and peas. But these fourteen will not even eat the rawest of vegetables or the most tempting fruit from Peachland. Finally the authorities realized that extraordinary measures had to be adopted.

A physician was summoned, and he hit upon an expedient. Each Doukhobor was laid on his back, pinned to the floor and liquid nourishment pumped into the whole outfit by scientific means.

This proved so successful that it was resolved to repeat the operation three times a day until the fanatics came to their proper senses, and now the Doukhobors have got to live whether they like it or not.

MAPLE SYRUG IS ADULTERATED

In Every Province of Canada, Only One Quarter Being Found Genuine.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—(Special)—The Inland Revenue Department has just issued a report on maple sugar and syrup.

Out of eighty-five samples of syrup only twenty-two were found to be genuine and fifty-three adulterated.

In Montreal five genuine and seven adulterated samples were found.

In Toronto none were genuine and ten adulterated.

Only twenty-six samples of sugar were taken and of these only eleven were genuine.

In New Brunswick three genuine and two adulterated samples of syrup were gathered and two adulterated samples of sugar. No genuine samples were taken.

MULOCK WANTED FOR LIB LEADER

In Ontario and May Consent—Big Defaulter Awaits Arrest in Japan.

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—(Special)—H. W. Brick who left Toronto some weeks ago a defaulter to the extent of between forty and fifty thousand dollars from the Henry K. Wampole Co., is said to be in Japan and his arrest is expected daily.

In addition to his shortages with the Company, Brick is said to be indebted to the Toronto Baseball Club, of which he was secretary last season, the sum of \$8,000.

A serious movement is on foot with a view to getting Sir William Mulock to retire from the bench and accept the leadership of the Ontario Liberals in place of Hon. G. W. Ross.

It is believed Sir William's head is still in politics.

LOW WATER IS CAUSING LOSS

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—The amazing depth of water in the Ottawa river has caused a serious condition of affairs among the lumbering interests and entails thousands of dollars of loss to mill-owners and their workers.

The water is so low that it is impossible to get logs over the slide in Hull, and as a consequence mills down the river, whose supply comes from the Upper Ottawa, have been forced to shut down. At Hawkesbury, the big mills of the Hawkesbury Lumber Company are idle and about six hundred men are out of employment. Over in Mill the Eddy Company's saw-mill has suspended operations in the day time and runs only at night. At J. B. Booth's the big mill is running full in the day time, but only half of it is operated at night.

It is years since the water has been anywhere near as low as it is at present. At the far end of the pier at Britannia there is barely two feet and the same condition exists all along the river. Boats on the Lower Ottawa find some difficulty in navigating so as to keep clear of the shoals. Rain is badly needed to raise the level so that the mills may operate, otherwise the lumber output will be rather seriously affected.

MAINE FLECTION DISSAPPOINTS

Republicans and Prohibitionists With Narrow Majorities: Cobb is Governor.

PORTLAND, Me Sept. 10.—(Special)—The result of the main election is a disastrous victory for Republicanism and prohibition.

Everywhere Republicans majorities are enormously reduced.

Every city and large town went strongly against Governor Cobb and his prohibition policy but the small villages and country districts pulled him through with the smallest majority ever given a Republican candidate since 1882.

All the Republican Congressmen are apparently elected, though not all returns are in.

Congressman Littlefield who was opposed by the labour interests has so far a majority of 600 about a quarter what it was four years ago.

SHESSSED HER SO SHE SHOT HIM

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Sept. 8.—Miss Edna Irvine, daughter of State Treasurer W. I. Irvine, shot George H. Knighton, foreman of the Letter Cattle Company's Big Red Ranch, near Clermont, yesterday.

All Miss Irvine would say is that Knighton "sassed" her and she shot him for it.

Miss Irvine says she has been subjected to annoyance when her father has been away, and says Knighton was one of her chief tormentors. Yesterday morning the barn doors were left open and the horses got into the granary. Knighton returned to the house, after finding the doors open, and made some remarks about carelessness.

The girl whipped out a revolver which she carries on the range and snapped it in Knighton's face. The first cartridge failed to explode, but the second sent a bullet into the foreman's body.

PREMIERS MEET OTTAWA, OCT. 8.

With Federal Authorities and Will Then Discuss Many Big Questions.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—(Special)—Notice has been given for the provincial Premiers to meet the federal authorities in Ottawa, October 8.

While the invitation only mentions the re-arrangement of provincial subsidies as a matter for discussion, other matters will be taken up, notably the question maritime representation.

The question of apportioning a section of the Northwest around Hudson Bay to Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan will also come up as well as the preservation of Niagara Falls, the fisheries control and provincial taxes on commercial travellers.

CONSECRATION OF NEW ARCHBISHOP

HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 10.—Most Rev. Dr. McCarthy was yesterday consecrated Archbishop of Halifax with elaborate ceremonial. The celebrant of the Pontifical Mass was Monsignor Sharratt.

Among the clergy who took part were Monsignors Racicot, Montreal; Casey, John; Cameron, Antigonish; Vapillon, Chatham; Amord, Valleyfield; Archbishop Duhamel, Ottawa; Drs. Pace and Sheehan of the Washington University, and Father McGoldrick, of Brooklyon.

At the pontifical vespers in the afternoon the sermon was preached by Father Connolly, of Guelph, Ont., a former school mate of Dr. McCarthy.

The clergy of the diocese presented the new archbishop with a golden chalice and the lacy with a check for \$2,250.

300,000 VICTIMS ONE YEAR PLAGUE

LAHORE, Sept. 8.—The report on the plague in the United Provinces in 1905, which has just been issued by Mayor Chaston White, shows that entire districts have been swept, and that over 300,000 people died from its effects.

The Muttra district, which was the worst, had 15,014 deaths, as against 4,185 in 1904. "The scourge paralyzed the people," is the collector's graphic description.

It is believed that the rat flea is chiefly responsible for the spread of the plague and war has been waged against rats. Here is the rat's death record: Bareilly 215,103 rats killed; Allahabad, 77,335 rats killed; Badamut 66,241 rats killed, Azra, 57,711 rats killed.

Most of the municipalities give rat traps away to the inhabitants and Major Chaston White urges that the rat war should be carried on indefinitely.
